The Problem of Hospital Finance

Self-Righteous Protests Against Lottery

(A letter to the Editor from J. Bradshaw, A.F.I.A.)

Sir, -It was announced in the daily press of November 27th that a proposal to establish a State Lottery in Victoria will be submitted to State Cabinet early next year by the Minister for Health and Housing (Mr. Barry). The declared object of the scheme is the obtaining of adequate finance for maintenance and equipment of hospitals.

As has happened on previous occasions when a lottery has been proposed to meet the ever more insistent calls of hospital managements for increased financial support, the project has been denounced by various religious" and charitable "leaders."

Though I, as your readers will appreciate, am well aware that, at best, the lottery will the norm aware that, at best, the followy will be no more than a palliative, I feel con-strained to draw attention to the pharisaical attitude of those who, while voicing objec-tions to lotteries and other forms of gam-

tions to lotteries and other forms of gam-bling, uphold a financial system which auto-matically condemns the vast majority of people to a lifetime of poverty. Because they defend this iniquitous and inhuman financial system, their objections to the lottery represent nothing better than nauseating cant.

ORTHODOX ALTERNATIVES

It is well known that the hospitals (like most of us) are short of funds. It has also been found that the voluntary subscriptions method has not yielded an adequate amount. It appears obvious, therefore, that the State Government will be obliged, under the pre-sent set-up, either to proceed with the lottery proposal, or to impose some additional tax.

According to the Melbourne "Sun," the manager of the Royal Melbourne Hospital (Colonel Fanning) expressed the view that some form of direct or indirect taxation would be preferable to a lottery. The people of this country already are bearing a crush-

ing burden of taxation: on all sides we hear clamour for its reduction; on all sides we have evidence of the crippling effect it is having on production. Because of the act of base perfidy com-mitted by the unscrupulous Canberra Gang-sters in perpetuating the infamous Uniform Taxation Ramp, the State Governments are now excluded from the field of direct taxa-tion. Did those who object to the lottery now excluded from the field of direct taxa-tion. Did those who object to the lottery raise their voices in denunciation of that unprincipled violation of a solemn under-taking that Uniform Taxation would apply only for the period of the war and one year thereafter? They did not!

As between the alternatives of the lottery or some additional tax to finance hospitals, the lottery seems to me to be preferable in that participation in it is a VOLUNTARY act.

CAUSE AND EFFECT

As I have stated, and as is proved, the existing financial system condemns the vast majority of people to a life of financial poverty in a world of easily possible, if not at present actual, abundance. For individuals in that majority, practically the only hope of release from the limitations of financial poverty lies in the winning of

REAL SOLUTION IGNORED

Until money is created and issued on a scientific and honest basis, and its volume related to production so that income equivalent to the selling price of available goods and services (including hospital services) is always in the hands of the people, we will continue to witness an inordinate

scramble for it. Governments, no less than hospitals and other institutions, as well as individuals, have no option but to join in the scramble.

It can be predicted with certainty that, the Centralised World Dictatorship of Fin-ance and Bureaucracy being nearly an ac-complished fact, the resultant social condi-tions will cause a vast increase in the volume of complian volume of gambling.

I submit, therefore, that those people who have voiced those self-righteous objections to the lottery proposal are "straining at a gnat and swallowing a camel"; they behold the mote that is in their brother's eye, but consider not the beam that is in their own eye.

Finally, lest I should be misunderstood, It is an aware that the lottery cannot solve our basic financial difficulties, though it may solve the difficulties of those fortunate enough to win a substantial prize. It involves merely a redistribution of the existing inadequate supply of money. So also does taxation. We do not solve our community problems by transferring them; and, none of the alternatives to the lottery advocated by "moral" objectors thereto, re-presents any more than the transference of a problem, which the lottery proposal involves.

TEN YEARS' TASMANIAN BROADCASTS

(Electoral Campaign talk by JAMES GUTHRIE, B.Sc., on 7HO, Nov. 24.)

Next Sunday's will be the last broadcast you will hear for a considerable time from this session. Thus will end ten years of continuous weekly broadcasts. During those ten years we have attempted to place before a few people the realities of the political position. Our organisation, having branches throughout the British Empire, has fairly large resources of talent and brains, but our resources in money have been scant, because we had nothing but criticism to offer the big financial monopolies which run the political parties today.

Early in the piece we realised that the ability to understand the political set-up that confronts this world was not so much a question of logic as a question of ex-perciate certain eternal values. This be-ing so, it followed that the number of per-sons capable of appreciating the political situation was very small—that number be-ing probably less than one in a thousand of the adult population.

ing probably less than one in a thousand of the adult population. Viewed in this light, ballot-box demo-cracy, where everyone over 21 has a vote, can be seen to be full of dangerous possi-bilities, especially where that vote is mani-pulated by a few men, and used as a "man-date" to penalise every minority.

This alone, however, fails to explain the position of ever-increasing helplessness in which the taxpayer and his family find themselves. It doesn't explain, for example, why the British people, with more political experience than any other nation, should, after the most successful military campaign in their history, find themselves reduced practically to serfdom, and reduced almost to starvation level.

INTERNATIONAL PLOTTERS

We find, therefore, that wars are some-thing quite different to what the daily newspapers and public men have led us to believe. Wars are not like fights between two naughty boys; they are more like prizefights, with the promoters stand-ing well outside the ring and holding the prize-money. The promoters are not very fussy if the fighters bash themselves sense-

fussy if the fighters bash themselves sense-less—in fact, they prefer it that way. The promoters of the last prize fight can be recognised as a group of very powerful men, at present centred in New York, and who probably have been behind every scrap of the last fifty years—to go back no fur-ther. They have large interests in Russia and China, and controlling interests in the British Empire; they are violently anti-British, and are obviously working hard to eliminate England as a first-class nation.

British, and are obviously working hard to eliminate England as a first-class nation, hoping that after England goes the rest of the British Empire will be chicken's feed. We have, today, a powerful financial group fighting for world control, and there is little doubt that the Communists and the London School of Economics are being used by them as a fifth column in every country. The Bretton Woods Agreement is obvi-ously the work of this New York group, and it is designed to prevent any revolt against dollar diplomacy. England was forced to sign the Agreement in order to get a loan from New York; Australia is un-der no such compulsion to sign. England der no such compulsion to sign. England had to sign to get food for her people; after she had signed she did not get the food. Australia, please take notice.

There seem to be two things for thought-ful citizens in Tasmania to do; the first thing to do is to focus the limelight on those who would destroy the link which binds the British people together—as without that link, our existence as a free people would the political larrikins of Sydney.

FACTS TO BE FACED

In a city, where a large number of people are jammed together in a small space, all problems become exaggerated; the work of many people is very unattractive and un-

satisfying; the work of many more is quite valueless. It is easy to see, therefore, why the big cities, especially the big industrial cities, supply us with our political plague spots, and, at the same time, control the

spots, and, at the same time, control the majority vote. This ballot-box democracy, dangerous in small States, becomes political dynamite when it is used to control large States, or groups of States, as in Russia, India and Indonesia. These vast groups of peoples can be used by a few men for purposes completely unknown to the millions who are conscripted by the party machines. Out of the French Revolution came the conscript armies: out of the Russian Revo-

conscript armies; out of the Russian Revo-lution came the country of one political party and the concentration camp. This devilish work of destruction was made easy by the work of the Socialist intellectuals; it is the result of the mania for planning on paper without reference to the Jessone of

is the result of the mania for planning on paper without reference to the lessons of history or to the world we live in. The Socialist intellectuals of any integrity have repudiated their life work; they have gone back on practically everything they have said, but they have done the damage, and few know that they have changed and few know that they have done the damage, their minds. So it is that a generation has been reared on theories, which have no re-lation to any world ever known. And the complete severance of theory and practice has burst wide open the minds of men and women to every political charlatan who can find money to back him—and there is no shortage of money for political charlatans.

THE PRICE OF LIBERTY

Our task has been largely one of ex-posure. It is necessary to expose the enemy before you can fight him. This is neither a popular nor an easy task, but a very essential one. And the cost of carrying on this work has been left to a small number of us. We have appealed to the citizens of us. We have appealed to the citizens of Hobart for assistance, but it has not been

forthcoming, so we have decided to shut down this session next Sunday. Our exposure of the evils of machine politics and of the party system has, how-ever borne some fruit, and the fight put up by the Independents of this State is likely to encourage others to come forward up by the Independents of this State is likely to encourage others to come forward. But however good may be the representa-tives you put into Parliament, they will be to achieve great success unnot be able to achieve great success un-less they get very much more help and loyalty than they have had in the past. And I am sorry to say there is very little sign of this help and loyalty forthcoming

as yet. Too many so-called responsible people expect to buy freedom for their families at bargain prices. Men of experience, educa-tion and responsibility are strangely dumb in the face of probably the greatest col-lection of rackets every known in the his-

lection of rackets every known in the his-tory of man. This was not always so. What has happened to our "leading" men? Have they suddenly become dumb, or are they specially picked for the job? The character of the big city daily news-papers in this hour of crisis is appalling; their chief task appears to be to bewilder as many people as possible. In this they have been very successful have been very successful.

If we have been able to throw a little light in a few dark places, or to inspire one or two men to put up a fight to save the last remnants of Western civilisation, then our work has not been in vain—occasional assistance from our listeners, how-ever, would have made our task lighter.

goods in the shops, Britain's exports, on which the Government's entire economy is built, will decline."

It is not a case of Export or Perish, but of Export AND Perish.

"I could abolish rationing tomorrow," Mr. Strachey declared, and pile the food shops of every town in the country with food if I took off price control and allowed prices to treble. There would be a glut of food, not a shortage. "That is the one thing this Government will never do. The price of the main food items in the cost-of-living index has risen by only 22 per cent, from their 1939 level, and we are still holding them at that level.

"Only strict rationing, strict price con-trol and large subsidies by the Government can hold food prices down at that level, but is it not well worth doing? We shall not be able to take off rationing until the present world food shortage has been righted.

"In some cases, such as meat, I am afraid it will take a few years rather than a few months. But the position will get slightly better."

THE OBJECTIVES OF "TOTAL" WAR

By C. H. DOUGLAS in "Sovereignty."

If the general public is not imbued with full consciousness that war is the ultimate problem of civilisation, the responsibility for such lack as there may be does not rest with the organised publicity, which provides our syndicated information.

We are told of the horrors of the atomic bomb, of which a demonstration was conveniently available as the final episode of Japanese industrialisation; and concurrently, without discussion, and with every evidence of long preparation, world organisations have come into being and are functioning with the ostensible, and obviously laudable aim of dealing with war by making war so one-sided that it becomes a police, rather than a military, problem.

It would be wickedly perverse to under-estimate the arguments, which can be ad-duced in support of this attitude. Perhaps the fairest material prospect ever opened to human vision, the Promised Land of Plenty and Leisure, appeared, towards the close of the nineteenth century, to be at hand. The Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria marked the perihelion of a British Empire super-ficially invincible, widely, if not universally, respected, and far more united than any organisation of comparable size, either before or since the disintegration of mediaeval Europe; **UNDERLYING POLICY** organisation of comparable size, either before or since the disintegration of mediaeval Europe; and a Continent of Europe which, if it betrayed disquieting signs to the trained observer, yet remained the unquestioned and unquestionable centre of civilisation and culture. Fifty years later, Europe lies in helpless prey of conflicting ideologies and half-crazed fanatics; it and the British Empire, attacked from every quarter and to be mere children of the storm of war, whose only hope of survival is a refuge under the shadow of a World Government which will prevent its repetition. It may be so; but it would be unwise to resign our fate into alien keeping unless we are sure

The material ruin, which is the accom-paniment of modern war, as well as its heavy casualties in human life and happi-ness, may easily mislead us into supposing

do not resign our affairs into other hands. It has always been axiomatic that courage —resistance to fear—is a cardinal military virtue; and we may observe that world-government propaganda is directly aimed at the neutralisation of such courage as remains to us.

Now the essence of fear is the aberration of judgment, and it is desirable to consider this condition in connection with the re-vealing statement which appeared in the organ of P.E.P. ("Political and Economic Planning"), of which Mr. Moses Israel Sieff (most probably only the spokesman of much

Mr. Sieffs organ remarked: "We have proceeded from the assumption that only in war, or under threat of war, will a British Government embark on large-scale Planning." It is a fair deduction from these words that the interests of P.E.P. were vitally bound up with the promotion of war as an agency of compulsion and that "Planning" requires an aberration of judgment to be accepted.

REGIMENTATION WINS

We have just seen that the primary ob-ject of war is the aberration of judgment, and it is only a short stage from this to the elimination of judgment. This is in-herent. It cannot have escaped notice that unity of military (in the widest sense) com-mand was a feature, and quite a rational feature of the war, which was resumed in 1939. If you have only one desire or ob-jective, judgment of objectives is over for you. Your whole life becomes a mere ques-tion of administration and it can be extion of administration and it can be expressed graphically by a triangle with the apex uppermost. At this apex the Com-mander-in-Chief is told against whom he is to exert pressure. Everyone below the apex relinquishes personal sovereignty over his objectives in favour of "discipline."

his objectives in favour of "discipline." We know that it is impossible to have war without two opposing sides; and we can say therefore that war is a condition of affairs in which both sides are under the strongest possible pressure to subordin-ate or discipline each and every individual to an objective which is not even under-stood but is accented from above

The side, which "wins", is the side, which remains "disciplined," i.e., functionalised for the longest time. But when hostilities cease we invariably

But when nostinities cease we invariably find that "functionalism" persists. The vic-torious armies are not demobilised; food re-strictions, building restrictions, travel re-strictions, are only relaxed, if at all, with obvious reluctance. Both sides may, on balance, be heavy losers in modern war, but there is always one winner but there is always "functionalisation." War, but one winner. then, is not necessarily between nations; it may be between Government and People.

IMPOSING SERFDOM

IMPOSING SERFDOM Now, although the normal man refuses "Planning" or functionalisation "except in war, or under threat of war," there are powerful interests with functional objectives, which are determined to extend functional-isation to every field of activity. Vertical trusts are one form of such interests, and the raw material of them is "employment" or "Labour," and there is, although most Labour politicians may not understand it, the closest connection between "Labour-Socialism," vertical trusts or monopolies, and war. August Bebel, in 1892, assured Bismarck that "the Imperial Chancellor may rest assured that German Social Democracy (Socialism) is a sort of preparatory school for militarism." The reverse is equally true. Militarism is the best possible preparatory school for Socialism. Bismarck accepted the argument in full, never in any way inter-fered with the Socialists (who were busily engaged, inter alia, in debauching British trades unionism) and himself remarked: We march separately, but we fight together Without presuming to define the whole nature of that mysterious creature, man, it is nevertheless possible to say fairly ac-curately that he "possesses" a number, per-haps an infinite number, of functions. Prohaps an minute number, of functions. Pro-vided that fear can be brought to bear, he can generally be persuaded to surrender any one and eventually, practically all, of these functions, to external control, so that "he" the independent will the e," the independent will, the possessor initiative, is eliminated. The individual "he. has then lost his sovereignty, and cannot prevent the handing over of his "national" sovereignty any more than he can prevent his material property in land or otherwise

To some extent, this position appears to be fairly general. It is even noticeable in Australia, where the crooks, gunmen and murderers have very little fear of the authorities; and citizens, who have placed their trust in "The State" and given up their arms, are at the mercy of the underworld. This also applies where they have surrendered themselves to other forms of racketeering, such as rationing, price fixing, and the master racket—taxa-tion. Of course, the latter rackets are quite legal; the only difference at the moment being that the robbery is without violence. being that the robbery is without violence.

ROOSEVELT'S RUSES: Mr. Ira Hirschmann, in his book, "To a Promised Land, tells how the late President Roosevelt planned a mission for rescuing Jews from Europe. Mr. Hirschmann was commissioned to visit Turkey in 1944 with instructions "to take any steps necessary to rescue as many Jews as possible." He was authorised "to negotiate with enemy, diplomats in Turkey and to disregard the normal wartime prohibitions against dealing with the enemy." By direct negotiations with Roumanian diplomats. "Hirschmann obtained passage into the Red Sea of rescue ships which brought out thousands of Jews from Roumania." Apparently F.D.R. overlooked the Gentiles under the yoke of Hitlerism. This coroborates other evidence that Roosevelt was a willing tool in Jewish hands. He was surrounded by what was known as the "Jewish bodyguard" at the White House.

PROTOCOL PLANNERS: An article in the Chicago "Women's Voice" of May 30, by the Jew, H. H. Klein (New York at-30, by the Jew, H. H. Klein (New York at-torney), casts an interesting light on the "Protocols of the Learned Elders of Zion." LAYOUT OF TYRANNY

If we imagine the apex of the military hierarchy which is organised to control the fighting function of man to be represented by a dot, and a similar dot to represent the apex of an organisation to control each of the functions of the individual—a Min-istry of Food, Housing, Transport, Supply, etc.—and place them side by side in a hori-zontal line, and then draw from each of these dots a line to the individual whose functions are thus taken from his own confunctions are thus taken from his own con-trol, the diagram thus produced is again a triangle, but this time its apex is downward.

Perhaps it may be advisable at this point to observe that there is nothing necessarily mystical about this diagram. It is one quite familiar to "Scientific Management" experts and is used in factory organisation. The link, which converts the dots into a line, is Finance Finance,

If on the top of this inverted triangle we superimpose the diagram of the military organisation (which in "peace-time" is re-presented by N.K.V.D. or Gestapo), which supplies the fear-motive, we have the Red Star of Russia, the Seal of Solomon, the works diagram of the World Socialist Em-pire. THE TRAGIC LESSON OF YUGOSLAVIA

(Concluded from last issue.)

The following is from the current "Reader's Digest's" condensation of a forthcoming book by Bogden Raditsa, who comes from an old Croatian family, was for many years a high-ranking official of the Yugoslav Government, in 1945 became chief of foreign press section of the Tito regime's Ministry of "Information," and is now engaged in journalism in New York:

I began to be concerned about my own status. I had long perceived the use that the Communists were making of me. I had a certain following among Yugoslav readers. Now, if I published an article in a Yugoslav periodical, it would be given to read to young intellectuals who had been arrested by the Communists; and the Com-munist commissar in their prison camp would say to them:

would say to them: "See! Raditsa, who is not a Communist, is in the Government, accepting Tito's de-mocracy. Why should you not accept it, too

too?" Two young Communists had been thrust into my office. With the support of the chief of personnel of the Ministry of In-formation, Nedelkovich, they undertook to deal with the foreign correspondents in Bel-grade. I was to be chief of the foreign press section; but I was to have no con-It seemed to me that all Yugoslavia was

being driven into madness by the Com-

munist frenzy. In Dalmatia young Com-munists were chosen to become perfected Communists by being obliged to shoot such fascist prisoners as happened to be their childhood friends. In Montenegro, when certain of Mikailovich's "Chetniks" were seized, their sons who were Partisans were schooled to Communist reliability of char-acter by being made to shoot their fathers. I realised that whatever I could do for my country I could not do within its bor-ders. I had been unable to disguise my unhappiness, my horror. Thereupon I was accused of being an American agent, and I learned from friends that I was being fol-

learned from friends that I was being fol-lowed by agents of OZNA. I decided to resign, to go abroad. But I was told by an official: "Kardelj forbids you to have the courter."

to leave the country." Then I proposed to resign but remain within the country, in my home province of Dalmatia. I talked with Velko Korach, the Ministry of Information's real chief: He

said: "If you do not like what you are doing "If you do not like what you are doing now, you may enlist in a labor battalion to rebuild a destroyed village or you may be mobilised, into the army. But you cannot just resign. Nobody is free in this country to resign without permission." I said to myself: I must escape. I must find somebody who will quietly get me a passport, I knew it could not be Korach, Korach wanted to keep me in Yugoslavia, and urged me to join the Communist Party. I said: "I cannot. The Party requires a man to renounce his ties to humanity—and indeed to family and to God." Korach became pale—and very formal.

Korach became pale—and very formal. He no longer addressed me as "Drug" (Comrade) Raditsa, but only as "Gospodin" (Mr.) Raditsa. "Gospodin Raditsa," he said, "you are a

man who does not believe in an ideal." ' "But I do believe in an ideal. I believe in total burgers."

Looking back over my experience, cer-tain facts seem clear: 1. The Russian long-range design regarding Yugoslavia is to unite its six peoples to Bulgaria and Albania in a Balkan Federation and then to bring that federation into the Soviet Union as a "Republic." Then the Soviet Union as a "Republic." Then the Soviet Union would stretch from the Black Sea to the Adriatic Sea and, through Albania, to the Mediterranean. Never, even in Czarist days, has Russia been in a position to contemplate so large a sweep into the West.

the West. 2. An obstacle to this design is the sud-2. An obstacle to this design is the sud-den unpopularity of the Russians in Yugoslavia. For hundreds of years, ever since the days of Turkish rule, the Yugoslavs have looked to Russia as a deliverer. Two months of Russian occupation sufficed to destroy the dream. These Communist Russians were not a superior people. They had less education, less culture, a lower standard of living than the Yugoslavs. They added lower standard lavs. They added

superior people. They had less education, less culture, a lower standard of living, than the Yugoslavs. They added nothing to Yugoslavia but the brute force, the organised ruthlessness, in which Com-munism had trained them. 3. The Yugoslav Communists, who, by means of Russian soldiers, have made themselves into the governing element, are relatively few. They would not poll ten percent, of the votes in really free elections. Many Yugoslavs see clearly, now, the affinity between Communism and German Fascism. Belgrade wise-crackers, behind their hands, call Tito "Titler" and his regime "Ti-to-talitarianism."

RESISTANCE OF CHURCH

4. The chief source of resistance to the The regime in Yugoslavia is religion. Hence the war conducted by that regime against the Church.

One night in Belgrade I was talking with Dr. Lyubo Leontich. He had been one of the first outright Fascists in Yugoslavia. But to Communists it is not a crime to have been a Fascist, provided you afterward go over to an alliance with the Communists. Dr. Leontich had gone over. He is now the Yugoslav Ambassador to London. He and I were talking about Monsignor Ante Boni-fachich, Archbishop of Split. Bonifachich, during the war, in his pastoral letters, had condemned both the fascist "Ustashi" and the Communist Partisans for their massacres Partisans from Fascist bands, both Dal-matian and Italian, and had finally been arrested by OZNA.

arrested by OZNA. "It will be necessary to execute him," Dr. Leontich told me. "Why? What has he done?" "What he has done is not the point. It will be necessary to execute him in order to show that the new Yugoslav Government is not afraid of the Church." But the clorup and their compressions

Is not afraid of the Church." But the clergy and their congregations are not intimidated. In Zagreb I saw a procession of people coming into the city from a shrine of the Virgin Mary. With them was Archbishop Stepinets, who had just been released from a three-week ar-rest by the Partisans. He came along in the procession in the midst of 20,000 who tumultuously shouted: "Long live Stepinets' Long live Christ

"Long live Stepinets! Long live Christ the King!"

Virtually all Yugoslavs belong either to the Roman Catholic Church or to the East-ern Orthodox Church. And in the Serbian East, as in the Croatian and Slovenian West, it is milition the stought extrement it is religion that stands staunchest against Communist domination.

COMMUNIST DECEPTION 5. Americans are extremely popular in Yugoslavia. They need not fear that their contributions to Yugoslav welfare are un-recognised. The People's Front Government insisted that the U.N.R.R.A.'s chief execu-tive in Yugoslavia should be a Russian, but the mass of Yugoslavs are fully aware that it was chiefly from America that the U.N.R.R.A. help came that saved perhaps 5,000,000 Yugoslav lives. Yugoslavs know of America from their fellow-countrymen, thousands of whom have settled in the United States, and by letters or visits home have spread the news of American liberty and opportunity. To-day that news has a fresh meaning. Now, more than ever, Yugoslavs think of the land of the free beyond the ocean. America, not

of the free beyond the ocean. America, not Russia, is the dream of peasants and workers alike

Yugoslavia only for the Communist Party. And political liberty for them means complete political dominance by them.

The Communists promised Yugoslavia freedom of private property. They have taken 75 per cent, of Yugoslav industry and trade into ownership and operation by the State.

THE NEW RULING CLASS

The Communists promised Yugoslavia that there would be no ruling class. To-day the best food, the best clothes, the best houses go to the new Communist officials. houses go to the new Communist officials. There is even a derisive phrase for the people as a whole. ANXIETY." The point is, we are in the midst of one of the greatest and best organised famines in the history of the world—and now this silly glut appears out of nowhere! Human-ity is getting up to its old larks again: starving in the midst of plenty. That's what it likes best. It's enough to drive the planners mad. There they were, not only with plenty practically abolished, but well on the way to getting Britain to sub-sist on half rations, when up pops a dirty great big harvest out of nowhere and nearly sandbags them! There ought to be a Royal Commission about it. Nowadays you can get a Royal

He is, in fact, unimpressed by the conspiracy of Nature and the growers to bung up the Scarcity Plan. Addressing a meeting of the Na-tional Union of Agricultural Workers, he is reported to have said: "There are the faintest signs of improvement in the world food situation, but the improvements in. 1947 will be counter-balanced by American action in de-controlling prices." He was given the task of administering scarcity, and how the blue blazes can anyone do that if someone removes the scarcity! Dash it all! Be British!
