Jews Plot For World Control

Mrs. Sarah G. Millin, in her war diaries, quotes General Smut's as telling her in 1942 that American Big Business was going to run the British Empire and the entire world after the war.

When he spoke of "American Big Business" Smuts was probably referring to the Jewish International Financiers, whose headquarters are in Wall Street, New York.

Those people who urge us to break down our immigration standards and allow all types of people into the country, point with pride to America, which they claim as a successful "melting pot" of all nations. It has been rather brutally stated that, as with all melting note the segme tonds to come has been rather brutally stated that, as with all melting pots, the scum tends to come to the top. The "melting pot" idea has not worked out in America; it has resulted in the destruction of the genuine culture and traditions of all types. In his latest book, "The Struggle for the "World," the famous American writer, James Burnham, frankly answers the question whether America, if it became world leader, would become a world tyrant. He writes:

THE "MELTING POT"

"There is in American life a strain of callow brutality. This betrays itself no less in the lynching and gangsterism at home than in the arrogance and hooliganism of soldiers or tourists abroad There is in many Americans an ignorant contempt for ideas and tradition and history, a complacency with the trifles of merely material triumph. Who, listening a few hours to the American radio, could repress a shud-der if he thought that the price of survival

would be the Americanisation of the world?" America is subjected to more Jewish in-America is subjected to more sewish m-fluence than are most countries. It can be said that America is a base from which the International Zionists work to control the entire world. The films and radio have been used to break down the standards of all coeffective all peoples.

HUGE DOLLAR LOANS

HUGE DOLLAR LOANS But the most dramatic attempt to con-quer the entire world for the Jewish ideal of the World State, in which all national sovereignties are to be swept away, is being made on the economic front. This is the real meaning of the proposals to pour enormous dollar loans into Europe. Needless to say, American dollars will not actually be shipped to European coun-tries. These countries will be granted dol-lar "credits" in America, which can be used to buy American goods.

to buy American goods. Well may it be asked how these dollar loans are to be repaid? Obviously these loans are to be so immense that the borrow-ing countries could only repay them by ex-porting goods to America but the Jewish financial policy dominating America will not permit this. Recent figures published in America reveal that America is at present exporting $\pounds5,000,000,000$ worth of goods annually, but is only importing at the rate of $\pounds2,500,000,000$ annually.


THIS "FREE" MEDICINE

THIS "FREE" MEDICINE The mis-called Free Medicine scheme soon to be imposed is estimated to cost between £2 millions and £5 millions, which will be borne by taxpayers, including the victims whom it is supposed to benefit. A similar scheme operates in New Zealand; it com-menced at 4/- per head per year, now raised to 13/6 per head a year—and, of course, there is no improvement in the health of the people, so it must be accepted as a failure. Good food, housing and clothing are much more important than colored fluids in medicine bottles; but our Socialfluids in medicine bottles; but our Social-istic Government is determined not to heed by the recent press disclosures of poverty and slums in Melbourne, there are many more important uses for the people's money than wasting it on chemical dopes; in any

case, if the Government stopped robbing the people of their money by taxation, they could buy their own choice of poison.

PEOPLE v. BUREAUCRATS

New light was thrown on the chaotic situation in France by a report in the Mel-bourne "Age" of June 14, entitled "Protest Against Officialdom," which states: "The food grainst four works have Against Officialdom," which states: "The food crisis of the past few weeks has developed into a large-scale movement on the part of traders and the general public against economic controls and bureaucratic methods." Actually, the original shortages, which provoked the crisis, are no longer acute. 20,000 were turned away from a demonstration against governmental re-striction on trade and the 50,000 present voted for a half-day strike against economic striction on trade and the 50,000 present voted for a half-day strike against economic controls and the abuses of officialdom in general. There was much more of this, and it is quite clear that the socialistic bureaucracy is preventing the French people—and indeed all others—from rehabilitating themselves. This and many other examples of Socialism in practice over the past few years should be sufficient to satisfy even the most fanatical advocates that it just will not work. (Continued on page 3.)

He is said to have explained to Gutzon Borglum, the famous sculptor, "if you want to get ahead in politics keep out until you have made your pile. That's what I did. Once you have money, everything opens

what Meyer meant by "public service" and in whose interest, is open to question in the light of the foregoing quotation.

Six months after he became president of the World Bank, Eugene Meyer resigned from that position. He said that he felt that he had got the bank started.

More Jewish Key Men

COUPON SURRENDER IN VAIN

ADELAIDE, Thursday. -- People's sacrifices in giving up their meat ration, ostens-ibly to make more meat available for export to Britain, have achieved "exactly nothing" because of the Federal Government's apathy, the president of the Stock-owners' Association (Mr. J. Keith Angas) said vesterday.

The public was still being encouraged by the Commonwealth to surrender meat cou-pons, but the Government had taken no definite action to get meat, he claimed. Although the Federal Government had been advised that this sacrifice would be in vain unless definite action was taken to

in vain unless definite action was taken to acquire the equivalent weight in meat, nothing had been done.

Almost all the meat obtained in response to the appeal had been voluntarily submitted by the producers, who had thereby collec-tively suffered a substantial financial loss.

The Government persisted in asking the public to surrender meat coupons, hoping that reduced consumption would create a surplus of meat for export, but no one had been appointed or was in a position to ob-tain the surplus of meat for Britain.

SENSATIONAL STORY BEHIND **CANADIAN SPY TRIALS**

Prime Minister King continued to explore the over-all political implications of the documents with Prime Minister Attlee and Foreign Minister Bevin. With the meeting of the Big Four powers scheduled to start in December, they appreciated that the pre-mature disclosure of the spy plot might im-peril any chance of harmony. So complex was the problem that King and Attlee de-cided to cross the Atlantic and talk with President Truman. In retrospect, Moscow's reaction to this three-day meeting is significant. While Truman, Attlee and King were meeting aboard the naval yacht "Sequoia" anchored in the Potomac, the Soviets were celebrat-ing the 28th anniversary of the Russian Revolution. Foreign Minister Molotov, in an 80-minute speech, bluntly said: "It is not possible at the present time for a technical secret of any great size to remain the exclusive possession of some one country or a narrow circle of countries. We will have atomic energy and many other things too." THE IDENTITY OF "NORA"

During the fall of 1945 considerable pro-gress was made toward identifying the prin-

gress was made toward identifying the prin-cipals in the spy ring. Among the documents was a mailing list on which Colonel Zabotin had tabulated everything dispatched by him to Moscow on January 5, 1945. Inspector Leopold real-ised that this was the master key to the entire network, for it showed not only the type of information sent, but named the source source

source. Number 175 on this list was credited to "Nora." It consisted of "telegrams 10, ques-tionnaires 3, photos 11." Gouzenko recalled that he had put the telegrams into code, He had been ordered to burn the notes, but instead had taken them from the safe; and they were now in the possession of the Canadian Government. The notes were copies of secret cables

The notes were copies of secret cables received from England. Even today their contents are so important that they cannot he revealed. They concerned matters which belowed not evolview to Concerned but belonged not exclusively to Canada, but which had been entrusted to Canada by other Governments. Unless the leak could be stopped, the relationship of Canada and friendly States might be compromised. The discovery of "Nora" was therefore a mat-ter of high priority. Fortunately, Gouzenko had learned her name—Emma Woikin.

IN EXTERNAL AFFAIRS DEPT.

"Your written instructions are understood and some preliminary work has been accomplished on the specific tasks set. Badeau informs me that the most secret work at present is on nuclear physics—bombard-ment of radioactive substances to produce energy. Be-fore the war we got 21b of margarine a week. Now we get ½lb and ¼lb of butter and 1lb. of sugar between us. Things are certainly no better." Mrs. Mary Herbert, a war widow with children: "Indeed, we are far from better off. I'll join the Housewives' League in the hope that they can do something." Another widow pensioner: "I hardly get one decent meal a week. I just can't get along on my pension with rations as they are." —Melbourne "Sun," July 4.



HERRENVOLK HEBREWS **HERRENVOLK HEBREWS** During the hearing of a charge of "threat-ening behavior," arising from a meeting sponsored by the British League of Ex-Ser-vice Men and Women, it was stated that in the district of Dalston (England) there were eight synagogues within a quarter-mile radius of the meeting. No mention was made of the number of Christian churches. Next to be sealed off was "Bagley;" Ned Mazerall, who was found to be Edward Wilfred Mazerall, a Bachelor of Science in electrical engineering, and a member of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers. He had worked for the Canadian Westinghouse Company and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, and in 1942 he had joined the National Research Council in the development of radar. A tall, broadhad joined the National Research Council in the development of radar. A tall, broad-shouldered man with a large head and an unruly shock of hair, he was married to a well-known Canadian concert pianist. Well-known Canadian concert plantst. In various notes written by Lieutenant Colonel Rogov were entries which indicated that, on April 4, he had paid out money as follows: "Back—\$100, "Badeau"—\$30, "Bag-ley"—\$30. On May 8 there was another entry showing \$100 paid to "Back." The sums were so small that it was apparent that money had not lured the secret agents to act as they did. that they were born into this world to have their lives completely organised by other people so that there shall always be full employment. Social Crediters have been saying for

years (events always proving them correct.) that improvements in technical production processes must result in increasing production (unless restriction is intensified) with decreasing distribution of purchasing power through industry. Social Crediters have pointed out what can be proved mathe-matically, apart from the proof of actual facts, that as modern industry becomes more and more efficient it distributes less and less of the purchasing-power required to buy its own output.

If we were a sane community we would hail this fact as progress, reduced hours of work for those required in industry, and ensure that enough supplementary pur-chasing-power was distributed to the people in the form of national dividends and sub-sidised prices, in order that the people could buy all that was produced. But we don't do this. The goods produced can only be sold in their entirety by such means as creat-ing increasing debt for non-productive pub-lic works or by exporting more than is im-roted THIS FULL EMPLOYMENT

At the moment we have not got the prob-lem of this so-called over-production; the restrictive Socialistic policies being imposed upon us prevent it. But in America, where modern scientific production has pro-gressed further than in any other country in the world, we can see the problem very in the world, we can see the problem very clearly. If America is to have full-employment under the present financial rules, she must have a stupendous export trade, with high tariffs to prevent other countries sending goods into America. In other words, Americans cannot buy all that they can produce: they have a "curpus"

countries sending goods into America. In other words, Americans cannot buy all that they can produce; they have a "surplus." It may be argued that Americans could not consume all they can produce, in any case. If that is so, why should they per-sist with the policy of full-employment? Why not produce all that they require in two or three days per week and have more leisure? No, the Jewish policy does not permit economic security and increasing leisure. The result is that Americans are used by the Jewish hierarchy to further its policy of world conquest. American goods, which Americans cannot buy, are "sold" to other countries. These countries must first borrow the dollars with which to buy the goods. The borrowed dollars are only financial "credits" created by the Jewish controllers of the American banking sys-tem. tem.

THE END AND MEANS

THE END AND MEANS There is no doubt that the International Jew's ultimate aim is complete World Domi-nation. Communism and Socialism are necessary to further that policy. A WARNING FROM SIR EDMUND HERRING

The Chief Justice of Victoria, Sir Edmund Herring, is to be congratulated on a notable address in the Assembly Hall, Melbourne, on Monday, June 23. Sir Edmund warned his audience that there was very real danger to democracy in Australia.

We disagree with Sir Edmund's contention that because industrial and technologi-cal development has progressed at such a pace, all Governments have been forced to intervene in the economic life of the community; but the following statements, as reported in the Melbourne "Age" of Tuesday, June 24, have our general commendation:

Sir E. Herring said wonderful national opportunities were being thrown away. There was distrust, bitterness, intolerance, selfishness and a sense of frustration that could lead to disintegration and tyranny. The threat to democracy and freedom

was thus very real in Australia at present.

Modern democracy was born in a differ-ent atmosphere. Social cohesion came then from a common creed that gave our forefathers a stern sense of duty and moral standards to guide their conduct.

Nowadays, a great deal was heard about rights, but very little about duty. There seemed to be a deficiency of faith not only in God, but in ourselves, in truth, in beauty, in justice, in freedom and in love.

To make democracy work and to safeguard appreciation of the eternal verities and be able once more to agree about fundamentals. Sir E. Herring said the relationship of

the State and individual must be such that there was secured to the individual a spirit-ual and intellectual inner life wholly free; a sphere of action not controlled by Government. In the maintenance of demo-cracy and freedom it was necessary to make everyone realise what a heritage it was.

Too many nowadays took it for granted. It was necessary that all should be freedom-conscious and determined to retain

freedom. Functions of Government were being widely extended, and the number of public servants greatly increased .

It was vital that the individual citizen should always be able to approach the courts of law; the courts which were his protector. So, too, we must demand the very highest standards of integrity in our public servants.
