The Communist Menace and the Crimes Act

With the continued spread of Communism in Asia and across Eastern Europe, and with the periodic disruption of our industries in Australia by Communists and their dupes, many people who value the British way of life and have no desire, despite its shortcomings., to exchange it for socialist totalitarianism or Communist dictatorship, have felt that some action should be taken, without delay, to prevent the further undermining and destruction of our civilisation by the Red enemies of free speech and liberty of action.

Although recent news of Communist activities from overseas, and the disclosures by Mr. Lang and others concerning Communist infiltration into our democratic institutions, and into high Government positions, makes it easy to decide that action should be taken, it is possibly not so easy to decide what particular form that action should take.

Do We Need An Enquiry?

During recent months there has been a demand for a public inquiry into Communist activities in Australia, to uncover the anti-social nature of their work and its insidious effects; but a survey of the literature distributed by Communists for the guidance of their fellow Communists, including the works of Marx, Lenin, and Stalin, and the abundant evidence of the results of their work here and overseas, leads one to wonder what additional evidence of Communist lying, treachery, espionage, treason, double dealing, sabotage, and sedition a Royal Commission could bring to light which is not known to us already.

The writings of Marx, Lenin, and Stalin, from which the Communists absorb inspiration, make it abundantly clear that the ultimate purpose of all Communist activity is the overthrow of "bourgeois democracy" through insurrection and the establishment of what is euphemistically described as the "dictatorship of the proletariat."

The democratic trappings with which the comrades are wont to bedeck themselves are merely so much camouflage to attract the unsuspecting, and to gain entry into circles from which they would be excluded were their real intentions

Manufacturing "Facts"

The apparent popularity of what purports to be Communism is used to counterbalance the extreme unpopularity of the real Communism—a device Karl Marx himself wore threadbare, when the fallacy of his theory of the class struggle leading inevitably to revolution was inescapable.

Like our modern economists, he manufactured "facts" to fit his theories, and that which was impossible of achievement by other means was supported and strengthened by subterfuge.

The Crimes Act

The Crimes Act 1914-1932 provides for action against the Communists of the widest possible nature, without a Royal Commission, and without any additional legislation, if the Attorney General really desires to take action.

If the desire of the Attorney-General for action against these enemies of Christian democracy within our shores was as clear cut as the provisions of the Act concerning the activities in which they have indulged, our social institu-tions, factories, schools, and homes could be cleared of their evil influence in a very short while.

Intimidatory action, such as we witness from the Communist bashers from time to time, could be dealt with under section 28 of the Crimes Act, which provides that:

"Any person who by violence or by threats or intimidation of any kind hinders or interferes with the free exercise or performance, by any other person of any political right or duty, shall be guilty of an offence. Penalty: Imprison-ment for three years."

Overthrowing The Constitution

As for those gentle souls whose zeal for a better world makes them impatient with "bourgeois" efforts for a better world through organic growth, and who wish to speed things up by bringing our Parliaments, Courts, and Constitution into contempt, hoping by this means to facilitate Red revolution and the forcible elimination of their opponents, Section 30 has been designed to meet their special case.

Since the Act is worded with such clarity as to make explanation superfluous, we shall quote some sections of the Act as they stand:

OUR POLICY

- 1. The preservation of Australia's sovereignty as a part of the British Empire, and the exposure of all internal and external groups which attack that sovereignty.
- 2. The preservation and extension of genuine local government.
- 3. The preservation and strengthening of all Constitutional safeguards for the purpose of protecting fundamental individual rights.
- **4.** The encouragement of all activities designed to bring Governments under more effective control by the electors.
- 5. The preservation and extension of genuine free, competitive enterprise and private ownership, and opposition to all Monopoly, whether it be "private" or State.
- 6. The support of a financial policy which will (a) permit free enterprise to make available to all individuals an increasing standard of living and greater leisure for cultural pursuits; (b) result in no further increase in the community's indebtedness and the sound business practice of gradually reducing existing debt.
- 7. Recognising that the basis of any sound economy is agriculture, the en-couragement of agricultural policies which will ensure the preservation and building up of soil fertility by organic farming and gardening; and the prevention of soil erosion and the protection of forests and watershed.

"30C. Any person who by speech or writing advocates or encourages—

"(a) The overthrow of the Constitution of the Commonwealth by revolution or sabotage;

"(b) The overthrow by force or violence of the established government of the Commonwealth or of a State or of any other civilised country or of organised government; or

"(c) The destruction or injury of property of the Commonwealth or of property used in trade or commerce with other countries or among the States

shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to imprisonment for any period not exceeding two years, and, in addition (if he was not born in Australia), to deportation by order of the Attorney-General, as provided in this Act.

Industrial Disturbances

Then we have Section 30J, which would be very effective in dealing with the comrades, who have nothing better to do than to organise industrial strikes with a purely political end in view, such as to embarrass a Government of the wrong political colour, or to embarrass a "Labour" Government and lead the workers closer to the Left, or even to express their contempt for a "bourgeois" Government overseas by depriving it of supplies, through suitable action on the waterfront.

"30J— (i.) If at any time the Governor-General is of opinion that there exists in Australia a serious industrial disturbance prejudicing or threatening trade or commerce with other countries or among the States, he may make a Proclamation to that effect, which Proclamation shall be and remain in operation for the purpose of this section until it is revoked. The section goes on to provide that any person who, during the operation of the Proclamation, takes part in or incites or urges a strike or lockout, shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction to imprisonment for any period not exceeding one year, and in addition to deportation, if he was not born in Australia.

Section 30K has also been designed to deal with persons who by violence or spoken or written threat or intimidation obstruct the provision of any public service by the Commonwealth, or obstruct or hinder the transport of goods or the conveyance of passengers in trade or commerce with other countries or among the States, or prevent persons offering or accepting employment for that purpose, without reasonable cause or excuse. The penalty is imprisonment for one year.

Seditious Activities

Sections 24C and 24D cover the activities of persons who engage in seditious enterprise or counsel or advise others towards seditious enterprise, the penalty being imprisonment for three years; and Section 25 provides a penalty of imprisonment for life for persons who

knowingly attempt to incite mutiny in the King's Forces; whilst Section 70 makes it an offence, punishable with imprisonment for two years, to communicate official secrets.

Seditious intention is defined in Section 24A:

"24A— (1.) Subject to sub-section (2) of this section, an intention to effect any of the following purposes; that is to say—

"(a) To bring the Sovereign into

hatred or contempt;

"(b) To incite disaffection against the Sovereign or the Government or Constitution of the United Kingdom, or against either House of the Parliament of the United Kingdom;

"(c) To excite disaffection against the Government or Constitution of

any of the King's Dominions;

"(d) To excite disaffection against the Government or Constitution of the Commonwealth or against either House of Parliament of the Commonwealth:

"(e) To excite disaffection against the connection of the King's Dominions under the Crown:

"(f) To excite His Majesty's subjects to attempt to procure the alteration, otherwise than by lawful means, of any matter in the Commonwealth established by law of the Commonwealth; or

"(g) To promote feelings of ill-will and hostility between different classes of His Majesty's subjects so as to endanger the peace, order, or good government of the Commonwealth, is a seditious intention."

Instigating Invasion

Section 24 provides the death penalty for any person within the Commonwealth who instigates or assists the invasion of the Commonwealth, or assists any public enemy.

An examination of Section 30A makes one wonder why the Communist Party has been able to operate in Australia since the Act became law.

This is the exact wording of portion

of the section:

"30A—(1) The following are hereby declared to be unlawful associations,

namely:

"(a) Any body of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, which by its constitution or propaganda or otherwise advocates or encourages: "(i.) The overthrow of the Constitution of the Commonwealth by revolution or sabotage;

"(ii.) The overthrow by force or violence of the established government of the Commonwealth or of a State, or of any other civilised country or of organised government; or

"(iii.) The destruction or injury of property of the Commonwealth or of property used in trade or commerce with other countries or among the States:

"Or which is, or purports to be, affiliated with any organisation which advocates or encourages any of the doctrines or practices specified in this paragraph; . . . "

No Excuse for Mr. Chifley

Now don't say, Mr. Chifley, that you didn't know that our Communists advocate the violent overthrow of our democratic institutions, or that they have incited persons to violence in connection with the numerous industrial disturbances they have engineered, or that they are affiliated with bodies overseas which advocate and encourage the overthrow by force or violence of organised government everywhere but in Russia and her satellites, or that they periodically attend meetings overseas for which purpose your Government permits them to be provided with passports.

How the Attorney-General Can Act

Section 30AA provides the machinery whereby the Attorney-General may take action through the High Court or the Supreme Court of a State for an order calling upon any body of persons to show cause why it should not be declared an unlawful association; and 30AB gives the Attorney-General the necessary power to require persons to answer questions or furnish information, or allow the inspection of documents, or provide information concerning the source or use of funds.

Any person failing or neglecting to answer questions is guilty of an offence, and liable to a penalty of one hundred pounds or imprisonment for six months.

Police Powers

In case the comrades are not very helpful with information, or the Attorney-General believes that additional information could be got from any other source, Section 10 empowers a justice of the peace, if he is satisfied by information on oath, to grant a search warrant authorising "any constable named therein, with such assistance as he thinks necessary, to enter at any time any house, vessel, or place named or described in the warrant, if necessary by force," and to seize anything which would assist him in his efforts against the enemies of democracy.

Taking Individual Action

In view of all the provisions of the Crimes Act covering activities and propaganda such as the Communists continually indulge in, why do Mr. Chifley and Dr. Evatt hesitate to take action against them?

Write and ask them yourself, but don't be satisfied with claims that they lack the necessary evidence upon which to act, or the power to make action possible.

Why not write to your own Parliamentary representative also and request him to demand that action be taken?

The only way democracy can be preserved from the designs of those who seek to destroy it is to deny them the opportunity to do so, and to expose their plans publicly.

The freedoms of democracy should not include the freedom to destroy democracy. By weakly permitting Communists to continue their anti-democratic activities, and to cloak those

How the Soviet prepares for War

The following informative article by the famous Polish Peasant Leader, M. Mikolajczyk, who had to flee from his Soviet dominated country, appeared in the English "Tablet" of July 3,

Some British and Americans to whom I have talked since my escape from Poland feel that we and the other Eastern European countries were politically persecuted by Russia because we were hotly partisan peoples. The Reds, these people say, are not the instinctive enemies of persons who are bereft of political beliefs.

I can only repeat that Red persecution recognises no political faith.

The world heard about the attacks on the Polish Peasant Party only because the party was organized and because some of us were privileged to lift our voices in indignation. In Poland, certainly, those who belonged to no party were treated just as criminally. Their voices were not heard because there was no organization through which they could speak. They were shot and hanged (and continue to be) in ghastly silence.

Communism and Capitalism

Stalin makes a point of saying, in his interviews with Americans especially, that Communism and Capitalism can exist side by side in the world today. The capitalistic States, he adds, can do business with him.

From a political standpoint, he is partially correct. Poland and Russia lived side by side from 1921 to 1939.

But from an economic viewpoint the man is lying, and the free world should not be tricked into believing that since it sells only to the State when selling to Russia, trade with that country is simplified.

Russia today is a gigantic economic menace to private enterprise everywhere. It has killed, or is in the process of killing, all private enterprise from Eastern Germany to Alaska.

Unlike even the most radical Socialist countries, it did not purchase the industries it has nationalized. And, unlike any other form of government, including the most radical Socialist form, it does not permit its workers the right to strike or quit or seek better pay.

activities from the unsuspecting, our Governments have helped to make revolution fashionable, if not respectable, and have thus helped to increase the ranks and revenues of the Party.

White ants and Red ants should not

be tolerated anywhere.

The right action at the right time would decrease their numbers considerably and awaken their many dupes the real nature of the Party whose s they support.

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Russia's Secret Trade Agreements

There can be no fair competition for world markets if Russia is in the picture. Its output has been stepped up considerably since 1939, and the countless millions of trained workers and professional men it has devoured in the more advanced countries that it has seized have given Russian production a quality it never had before.

Russian trade agreements with the captive States are secret deals by which it is able to suck the sustenance from each country, fix variable prices to be paid for what it needs, rob one country of its raw materials and force another and more industrialized country to deliver the finished product.

Stalin, sitting on top of nearly 300.000,000 human beings, directs their output as easily as a chess master moves a pawn. He does not need the products of the free world. He has everything he needs for war or peace.

The West has demobilized. Russia has not, and in addition has gained the armed forces of many countries. The West believes in the freedom of labour. Russia exploits its tremendous manpower. The

West's leaders can be removed from office

if they violate the essential rights of their peoples. The Communist gang cannot be removed, and when Stalin dies there will be well-trained men to take his place. The West maintains no secret forces in Russia. Russia maintains sub rosa forces in every country, ready to strike at every

There were many signs in Poland that the decision to make war on the free world was gaining pace. Travellers from Russia kept us informed about the tempo within that country, and daily we watched the moulding of Poland into a Soviet State which would be forced to aid in that conflict.

Perhaps the most vivid of the evidence was supplied by a Russian colonel whom I cannot name by name. I can only assure the reader that he does exist, that he did hold for me a certain affection, and that he never believed I would manage to get out of Poland to make this report.

Soviet General's Evidence

"I've just returned from the USSR," he told me just before I escaped. "The preparation for the war is everywhere. The people are now as ready for it as they were ready for Hitler's attack. Molotov is the new head of the war party. His picture now is displayed on the same level with that of Stalin. Pictures of the victorious Tsarist Generals, Suvorov and Kutuzov, are displayed everywhere through the country. I don't know whether our scientists have as yet been able to produce atom bombs, but we have

made great strides with rocket developments. We are training special units for service in each country of Europe. The units of instructors for France, Italy, and Germany are ready, and so is the one for Spain. We are preparing others, of course, for the South American countries—where we have made considerable gains of late."

"Personally," he went on, "I am not as confident about the economic collapse of the United States as the leaders are, but I agree that Great Britain is already in that collapse. Our men prepare the way for us in France and Italy, and they hope to bring about changes in the Go-

vernment there so that the Red Army will not be forced to march in. But, even if they fail, there are plans for the Army to move into those lands. The American, British, and French occupation forces in Germany will offer a token resistance, but they will naturally be liquidated. We have military plans to take Europe in less than a fortnight. Great Britain will remain neutral. It cannot endure another rocket war. The United States will declare war, but what does that matter? It is not prepared. It can have no offshore bases from which to attack the continent. We do not rule out the possibility of a negotiated peace with America.'

The Cold War

As is its traditional fate, Poland felt the first repercussions of the cold war. In April 1947, the Communist head of the Polish Security Police, the NKVD leader Stanislaw Radkiewicz, called a hurried meeting of province and district Communist leaders in Lodz and made formal announcement of the forthcoming conflict. Until the day Radkiewicz spoke at Lodz it had been a criminal offence for a Pole to mention the possibility of a World War III. Thereafter, the 100,000,000 persons living behind the Iron Curtain—as well as Russia's 180,000,000—began to be primed mentally for the war and to be encouraged to speak of it.

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"There will be a war with the West," Radkiewicz told the assembled Polish Red leaders. "This war will be won by the U.S.S.R. Of that there must be no doubt. The important thing at the start is to indoctrinate the people. They must be told, first, that American capitalists want to rule the world. They must be told that these capitalists fear the economic collapse of the United States, and in order to avert that catastrophe they have forced their Government into a policy of worldwide imperialism so that a war will result. In Poland we must quickly prepare for that war by liquidating the remnants of independent thought and action. We have been entirely too liberal inside Poland. We must hasten the communization of the country. We must liquidate dissident factions in the Socialist Party, and, of course, complete the extinction of the Polish Peasant Party."

Decentralise For Liberty

"It is my belief that if we carry into these years [ahead] the present system of concentrated economic powers and practices of both capital and labour, of concentrated populations, of concentrated industries of concentrated government domination and direction, of heavy taxation with its destructive effects on community and individual initiative and independence, of the steady impairment of our soil and water and the destruction of our forests and of irreplaceable minerals and oils, of the prevailing greed of various privilegeseeking groups, we cannot possibly avoid economic disaster. . . Yet it is a fact that the dominant thinking of the moment simply proposes a continuation, with ever-increasing government inter-ference, of this same hopeless system,"



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AND NOW DISINFLATION

I have on many previous occasions mentioned the difficulty I have in understanding this money business. I seem to have it quite straight in my mind until I read an article on the subject by an expert; then I'm in trouble. The most recent blow to my comprehension was dealt by an unsigned article in the August Review published by the Institute of Public Affairs, Victoria, and it came just as I thought I had recovered from the nasty knock delivered by Prof. G. L. Wood, which I mentioned in a recent issue.

I started off with a blithe spirit, a clear head, and eight whole pages of "Inflation" before me. "If I can't get something out of this," I reasoned, "I'd better hie me to a psychiatrist for an overhaul of the cranial gibbosities."

For a time all went well; there were several bits I understood—or thought I did—but very soon I had reverted to my financial norm, so that by the time I came to the statistical table the figures could have come from a logarithm table or a railway guide, for aught they meant to me.

Spending War-time Wages

I had, of course, no difficulty in understanding that money paid in wages for war purposes was liable to be spent by the people receiving it. In fact, my memory of World War I. was that they spent it with considerable gusto so that pianos, gramophones, and kindred amenities suddenly found themselves in large quantities and hitherto strange surroundings.

That was unreasonable, of course; the people could have been overwhelmed by inflation at any moment, but that didn't seem to occur to anybody, least of all the politicians. What I can't seem to remember, though, is shortages—except when in England, a shortage of meat and sugar. This time we have been more

scientific: we have proved that the tendency to inflation must have been there, because by restricting all wanted goods by regulation it became obvious that people would pay almost anything for what they wanted. No morals at all!

Losing the Thread

Soon after this, however, I lost the thread of the beastly argument. Having obtained what the article calls "an imbalance" by restricting production—not caused by war, as he freely admits—the writer informs us that "Price control of itself does nothing to correct inflation," because "it intensifies the inflationary pressure by maintaining the purchasing power of the money held by the public."

It is quite evident, then, that the problem is to get purchasing power away from the public without permitting them to spend it. This would correct the inflationary tendency caused by restrictions and embargoes on production. No economist likes the idea of "the

No economist likes the idea of "the public" having any money, and the writer of the article in question is no exception, for he complains that "the unprecedented increase in export income (309 £m in 1946-47) has greatly complicated the difficulties of restoring stability." Prosperity is a confounded nuisance; it's so difficult to make sense of it. And it isn't as though the experts had consciously done anything to cause it either

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An Unexpected Clearing

Although, as I said, I lost the thread of the argument why money and prosperity are bad for us, I stumbled into an unexpected clearing wherein I was enabled to perceive the professed objective of the writer.

He wants an easing of the general irksomeness, though two of his proposals strike me as somewhat ambitious.

One is to "lighten the taxation burden and at the same time to realise a substantial budget surplus," which appears to me an attempt to combine incompatible, if not mutually, exclusive ingredients of our economy; and the other is, "Self-discipline on the part of the business community in fixing prices," which will probably come about when the whole community exhibits the same quality. And the wolf shall lie down with the lamb.

The New Process

The process combining all the writer's wishful, remedies has a name. It has been used recently by Prof. Copland over the air. The name is "Disinflation."

We are exhorted not to misconceive. Disinflation is not Deflation. Deflation leaves you flat; Disinflation merely takes some of the wind out of you. There may be a greater difference, of course, for although when one is disinclined, one would naturally decline, it is not so clear whether, if one were disinterred, one would deter—or at any rate what or whom one would deter.

But the idea will appear subtle to some; especially to those who have no wind to spare. However, everything is relative, and much depends on the point of view. For instance, Absalom, could he see me, might regard me as being as bald as Micawber, but then, how would I look to a man who had to chalk his pate to avoid a miscue when heading a soccer ball?

And, after all, one finds the same niceties in the matter of direct taxation. Income tax is not to be confused with social service contribution, although there are lots of people who can't see the difference between a tax and a compulsory contribution.

But on the whole I don't know whether I have been enlightened or just dazzled. I am inclined to think that all I have gained is another word.

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MORE SOCIALISM FROM THE MELBOURNE "HERALD"

As we have never tired of pointing out, there are only two ways of getting individuals to do things in this world: by compulsion or by inducement. Socialistic planning inevitably leads to compulsion, but genuine free, competitive enterprise, controlled by consumers having adequate money "votes," would permit every individual increasing liberty.

Although the "big capitalist" Press is supposed to be fighting Socialism tooth-and-nail, it is instructive to note that the policy of the Melbourne "Herald"—to take only one "capitalist" paper—has invariably been to support compulsion as a basis of the community's economic arrangements. In a subeditorial in its issue of September 7 the "Herald" supports the campaign to compel traders to provide home deliveries for housewives. The "Herald" urges the Victorian Government to make it clear that it will apply compulsion to traders if they will not co-operate to provide home deliveries. The New South Wales Labour Government is mentioned favourably because of its Home Deliveries Act.

While we have the greatest sympathy with the present plight of the housewives, we point out that the present lack of service is the result of the arbitrary "planning" already imposed by Governments. Genuine service based upon adequate inducement will not be provided until such time as the "planners" are removed from their present positions. Most of the "planners" are Socialists, and they are well aware that the policies they are pursuing make it increasingly difficult for free enterprise to serve the consumer adequately. This situation then provides an excuse to make out that free enterprise will not supply the consumer unless compelled to do so by Governments. The only compulsion necessary is that which consumers can apply themselves—providing that there is genuine competition, and that free enterprise is not hampered by any artificial factors. For example, the imposition of further petrol rationing does not make the lot of the trader any easier. Further, increased costs resulting from the Federal Government's financial policies are another important factor which many traders must seriously consider at present.

If it can be shown that any group in the community is exploiting the community by denying them the right of a genuine alternative, electors can and should take action through their Government to prevent such exploitation. But there is, unfortunately, a growing tendency amongst many electors to expect Governments to manage all their affairs instead of taking action to do something for themselves.

We venture to predict that if enough housewives decided to bake their own bread for a few weeks, they would soon break up some of the monopolistic practices such as bread zoning, etc., which many housewives have been complaining about for some time.

But the basic causes of the lack of service today can be traced back to the economic and financial policies being imposed from Canberra. Unless these policies can be reversed, Socialism must come by one method or another. The "Herald" is doing its best to help the cause along.

A MENACE TO ALL NATIONS

Why should the ownership of British industry be allowed to pass into foreign hands?

One answer is that an entanglement of international obligations and debts in every direction gives enormous power to the international financiers, and makes the money power doubly master. Any attempt by a nation to set its house in order in such circumstances immediately raises international questions and becomes an interference with contracts made with the citizens of a foreign State. With the Press at its disposal, international finance can, with the greatest ease, in this way inflame one nation against another when any interference with its operations is attempted, the real inwardness of the proceedings being completely concealed from the people concerned. Thus the armed forces of the nations are always potentially—and at times, actually—at the service of international finance for the purpose of coercing other nations into submission. The operations of these men constitute the greatest danger to the peace of the world, and are a menace to all nations.

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THE HOMESTEAD ECONO

By JORIAN JENKS

(Concluded from Previous Issue. Reprinted from "The Small Farmer")

It is usually at this point that the critic of small production objects "That's all very well, but—does it pay? After all, ours is a money-economy, and the producers' cash-profit is just as necessary to him as a wage is to the worker. Whatever the merits of small production may be, the awkward fact remains that its cash rewards, over a period of years, compare very unfavorably with those obtained in other walks of life."

This criticism has substance. The authors of *The Small Man On The Land*. for instance, are of the opinion that "there was ample evidence before the war, that, while there was considerable variety in the earnings of individuals, the earnings of the family farmer were, on average, low and indeed insufficient to provide a reasonable standard of living." Even during the war, the cash income often with less than fifty acres was little more than the minimum farm wage, and, of course, much below industrial earnings. The accounts of several thousand farms collected and analysed by the N.F.U. indicate that during 1942-43 and 1943-44, while profits per acre were in inverse ratio to size of farm, profits per farm varied with its size. In other words, the fewer acres a man farmed, the more he earned from each acre; but the smaller his total income.

Relating Facts

Facts, however, are awkward or not according to the way in which they are interpreted and related to other facts. If the small producer on the land could be considered as the precise economic equivalent of the salary or wage earner in the city, the fact that his cash earnings are small would indeed by a serious matter. It is serious enough, certainly, to call for a more constructive policy. But we shall never arrive at such a policy by trying to reduce everything to money values.

What do we use cash for? Obviously for buying those things which we cannot produce for ourselves. For the urban worker this means almost everything. That is why it is only right that his cash income should be as lar e as pos sible. But the things, which we can produce for ourselves, need not be bought; they are dear at any price. Clearly the small producer does not (or should not) need to buy much by way of food or home. In this respect he is substantially better off than those who appear to earn good incomes, but have to pay them all out again in order to obtain the things that make life worth

living. He can give his family better food (because fresher and more wholesome) than a millionaire can obtain at fancy prices in the West End. He has a home which, being part of his farm, is included in its rent and involves no unproductive outlay of time and money on travel. He has plenty of occupation (sometimes almost too much), and because it is of direct interest to him has the less need of "leisure" and "pleasure." To him, social amenities and an occasional holiday are enjoyable relaxations, not indispensable antidotes to unsatisfying or nerve-straining labour. His chief economic asset, in fact, is the extent to which he can contract *out* of the money system.

Present Financial System

That is not to say that he can dispense with money altogether. He must buy boots and clothing, household utensils and certain groceries, reading matter and wireless licences; for the farm, tools and seeds, occasionally live-stock; and there are, of course, various small outgoings, and wages for any help employed. But his biggest cash outgoing

derives less from the nature of his own economy than from that of the general money system. The smaller the holding, the larger the capital expenditure on buildings and other forms of fixed equipment that it represents.

Under our existing financial system, this money capital demands rent or interest at a relatively high rate. It is notorious that small holdings, owing largely to the keen demand for them, always tend to be over-valued and over-rented. . . . The small producer pays in interest proportionately to his turnover, more than does the large producer, and much more than does the trader or industrialist. Often he is gravely handicapped by dilapidated or inadequate buildings, or lack of water or electricity, simply because his holding cannot bear any more capital charges. .

The economic case for the intelligent fostering of small production on the land can be stated quite simply. Our whole national future depends on our ability to provide our people with the Food, Homes, and Work which they need Unless national vigour is drawn from sound indigenous roots, no amount of juggling with the books, no excursions into power politics, can save us from the social neurosis which is already rampant in many countries and gathering momentum here at home.

There are two ways in which the attempt to secure Food, Homes, and Work (Continued on page 11)

MIXED FARM IS THE KEY TO THE NATIONAL PROSPERITY

"Wool is still the corner-stone of Australia's economic edifice," the Lieutenant-Governor (Sir Edmund Herring) said when opening the Ballarat Sheep Show.

Wool, he said, was the one industry that did not have to be helped along the road, and the one, which had always stood on its own feet.

Great populations living in cities, the Lieutenant-Governor said, take little interest in the country and its problems, or how much the man on the land is doing, but anybody who took the trouble to learn something of history will know that wool is the basis of Australia's economy.

Australia had a great future, he said, but we would only fulfil our destiny if we applied those same qualities of courage, endurance, self-reliance, and enterprise which had characterised the

pioneers of the wool industry for the past 100 years.

However, when we examine in detail the vast and varied nature of our resources we should pause to consider whether indeed Australia has ridden to wealth on the sheep's back as the Lieutenant-Governor says, or whether the sheep has stamped in our face.

Despite the fact that wool is our greatest income producer, there are vast tracts of country in eastern Australia suitable for mixed farming, with the capacity to carry millions of people which should be developed.
