The "Dollar Crisis" and Manpower Control

Conscription in Socialist Britain

(A Radio Talk over 3SR, Shepparton, by Eric D. Butler.) Over twenty years ago the famous English writer, Hilaire Belloc, pointed out that when men reintroduced an ancient evil, such as slavery, they used suitable terms in an endeavour to camouflage their intentions. Belloc said that he would await with interest the terms used to describe the re-introduction of slavery. Slavery is being increasingly imposed in various parts of the world today. It is true that it is not termed slavery, but slavery is the correct description of the direction of labour, which is one of the main characteristics of all totalitarian countries.

A correspondent recently wrote to a Melbourne daily newspaper and complained about a League of Rights advertisement, which stated that there was manpower control in Great Britain, and that Socialism in practice always led to direction of labour.

In case there are others who do not believe that Socialism in practice leads to manpower control, let us deal with this matter in detail. Under the Control of Engagement Order, 1947, passed in November of 1947, the British Socialist Government took the first major step towards imposing slavery upon the British people. Way Was Paved

It is instructive to recall that the way was carefully paved for the Control of Engagement Order by the start of the "dollar crisis."

After the necessary preliminary propaganda, the British Socialists in August of last year, announced that, because of "dollar crisis," they were compelled to introduce increased controls. competent observers in Great Britain did not mince terms in expressing the opinion that the "dollar crisis" had been deliberately encouraged in order to further Socialist policies. The peoples of all parts of the British Empire are now confronted with another instalment of the "dollar crisis. with the result that they are now threatened with still more controls. The 25 per cent reduction in dollar imports recently agreed to in London will be used as an excuse for more austerity. Mr. Chifley will now be able to use the "dollar crisis"

to intensify controls in this country.

There will be renewed talk of the necessity of building up certain industries in order to concentrate on increasing exports to dollar areas. Professor Copland and other economic advisers have already done same kite flying on this matter.

Labour Control

But if this proposal is to be put into practice, direction of labour will be necessary to ensure that the selected industries can function.

We warn Australians to beware of local Socialist planners attempting to use the "dollar crisis" to do what their fellow planners are doing in Great Britain. It is our considered opinion that the "dollar crisis" is largely the result of the policies pursued by the British Socialist Government, policies which Mr. Chifley also supports. It is interesting to note that the Chifley Government's principal economic adviser. Dr. H. C. Coombs, who has openly expressed himself in favour of the direction of labour, attended the recent Conference in London at which the "dollar crisis" was discussed.

What Happened in Britain

Australians can learn how to avert the threat of direction of labour by examining how it was introduced in Great Britain. As soon as the first talk of the "dollar crisis" started in Great Britain last year, the Communists were to the forefront in demanding direction of labour.

On July 15, 1947, Trade Union leader Mr. Arthur Deakin said: "I am prepared to say now that we must of necessity accept a limited direction of labour." Thus the way was paved for the British Government to go ahead, confident that it had the support of the so-called representatives of the workers. On August 7, 1947, Sir Stafford Cripps, the British high priest of austerity and controls, and the man whom Mr. Chifley frequently quotes, told the British House of Commons that "It has been decided to stop, by negative control, further people from going into the less necessary industries." Note how nicely Sir

Stafford explained the first step towards slavery.

But after the first step had been taken, it was easier to take the next step. As the "dollar crisis" got worse, more and more statements were made making it clear that direction of labour might be essential. By November of 1947 the final step had been taken.

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OUR POLICY

- 1. The preservation of Australia's sovereignty as a part of the British Empire, and the exposure of all internal and external groups which attack that sovereignty.
- 2 The preservation and extension of genuine local government.
- 3 The preservation and strengthening of all Constitutional safeguards for the purpose of protecting fundamental individual rights.
- 4 The encouragement of all activities designed to bring Governments under more effective control by the electors.

- 7. Recognising that the basis of any sound economy is agriculture, the en couragement of agricultural policies which will ensure the preservation and building up of soil fertility by organic farming and gardening; and the prevention of soil erosion and the protection of forests and watersheds.

The Use of Crises

It has of course, been argued that the Control of Engagement Order in Great Britain has not been very rigidly imposed. That is true, but now that the "dollar crisis" has become more acute, all controls will be extended. There can be no argument that Socialism thrives on crises. That is why one section of the Socialists, the Communists, openly welcomes war of any description. The controllers of Soviet Russia gave Hitter the all-clear signal in Poland in 1939 because they felt that a second European war would farther their policies. Consider the plight of Eastern Europe, China, and other parts of the world today.

It would be wrong to say that all Socialists deliberately engineer crises for the purpose of imposing more controls, but the policies of Socialism inevitably produce conditions, which provide the excuse far more and more controls. If we are to defeat the threat of slavery, we *must* be clear about this matter. At least many of the most famous Socialist leaders have said frankly that Socialism, the centrally planned society, cannot be implemented without manpower control. Mr. George Bernard Shaw, one of the founders of the Fabian Socialist Society, said back in 1921 that Socialism in practice means compulsory direction of labour with death as the final penalty for those who will not obey.

Disguised Slavery

In his book, "The Programme of the World Revolution," the famous Socialist of last century, Bucharin, outlined the necessity for a centrally-planned economy and then went on to say that this could only be made possible "by means of introducing labour record books and labour service. Everyone of the above-named class (the rich) should receive a special book in which an account is kept of his work, that is to say, his compulsory service.

It will be recalled that when direction of labour was introduced in Great Britain last year, not only was it argued that it was essential to prevent workers from going to the less essential industries, but that the "spivs," "drones" and "butterfiles" must be also directed to work. Totalitarians always have some excuse to try and divert attention from their real intentions. Bucharin, whom we have just quoted, was at least frank about his advocacy of direction of labour. He wrote: "Of course labour service for the rich should only be a transitionary stage towards general labour service." "Labour service" is another term used to describe slavery. It was used by Hitler and his National Socialists. Irrespective of the terms used, freedom-loving people must resist any policy, which seeks to compel them to work as, where, and when a Government official directs. The right to choose his own work and his place of abode, is a fundamental right which every individual should protect in the face of all propaganda about crises, dollar or otherwise.

TO THE POINT

Conservative-Socialism

"Now that the Socialists have adopted the Conservatives' foreign policy, and the Conservatives have adopted the Socialists' domestic policy, there is nothing left to quarrel about except the administrative details: not what should be done, which is agreed, but how and by whom. There is only one end to this kind of process is the end which has already been reached by Stalin, the outstanding Conservative Socialist of our times...'

In has Thoughts on the Constitution, Mr. Amery the British Conservative M.P., remarks: "What we call a change of Government is in fact only a change in the small, if important, element which is required to direct the general policy, while recruiting for it Parliamentary and pubic support, or at least acquiescence.

The most important aspect of the present political situation in this and every other 'democracy," is that "changes in Governments" merely mean changes in arguments to gain public support for a central policy, which, while it may be advanced by different methods, does not change. Terms like "Socialism" and "Capitalism" generally confuse the real issue, which is centralisation of power versus decentralisation

It may be worth while trying to have the non-Labour Parties elected by a small majority at the next Federal Elections, even if only for the purpose of demonstrating to their supporters that, unless prevented, the leaders of these Parties will strive to carry on the policy of centralising now being pursued so vigorously by the Labour Party.

Expediency for PrinciplesA copy of the Platform and Policy of the Liberal and Country League of Western Australia has come to hand. Under the heading of "Taxation," it is stated that Liberal policy favours the "Reconstitution of the Grant Commission to enable it to make provision for the full economic development of Western Australia." As There is no reference whatever to Uniform Taxation, the above statement presumably means the Western Australian Liberals like Mr. Menzies, favour the retention of Uniform Taxation and the establishment of a Grants Commission which will allocate funds to the States.

Thus the "anti-Socialism;" of Western Australia reveal themselves as true political intriguers, prepared to sacrifice principles for expediency.

Warning By An Economist

In an objective article in the April issue of the Economic News Mr. Colin Clark, one of the few economists of note who is not a totalitarian, after writing of manpower control in Great Britain warns Australians to beware of economic conscription: "We would believe like that sensible Australian ever had the idea of imposing industrial conscription, but unfortunately the facts point to the opposite conclusion. There has been too much kite flying, some of it from elevated quarters, for us to feel easy on this score.

"Dr. Lloyd Ross, the holder of a high position in the Commonwealth Department of Post-War Reconstruction, in an address before the Institute of Engineers . . . said that, after the war, manpower control should be used to secure industrial discipline.

"The anxiety of the Commonwealth to establish a complete network of labour exchanges throughout Australia requires some explanation; it has been admitted that the Commonwealth Department of Labour and National Service is watching the development of industrial conscription in Britain with considerable interest.

'A significant kite was flown recently by Mr. McAlpine, on the necessity of manpower control . . . for the preservation of full employment. Still more surprising was the subsequent statement to the same effect by Mr. Bellemore, Under Secretary for Labour and Industry in New South Wales."

Any Government, irrespective of its label, which insists upon a policy of "full employment," must inevitably impose manpower controls eventually. All anti-Socialists should face up to this fundamental issue.

Nationalisation

I have in a previous letter made reference to the nationalisation of industries pointing out that during the first year of the nationalisation of coal mines in Great Britain the loss was 20 million sterling. We are now informed that the loss on the British railways last year amounted to 25 million pounds. We are not told why under national ownership dividends were paid but under national ownership there is a loss, and a very big one too. The same thing has happened in Australia. With private enterprise the customer is given every consideration, but with a nationalised industry the customer's convenience is relegated to the background.

To say that an industry when it is nationalised becomes the property of the people and is under their control is a quibble and a fiction. No such thing takes place or is intended to happen. What transpires is the transference of the industry from owners (whose business it is amongst other things to ascertain the needs of the customer or clients. and to the best of their ability provide them with what the require) to bureaucrats who have no incentive to make an industry pay its way and who are out of touch with the requirements of the people for whose benefit the industry is supposed to exist.

Private enterprise with its capitalists has not been altogether free of blemishes, but State socialism or nationalisation with its possesses very bureaucrats dangerous possibilities. The bureaucrats will bring it home to the general public that they and not the community are the real controllers of the industries which the public has been led to believes it possesses and which realises at last that it has been hoodwinked by politicians whose main object was to secure votes in exchange for illusory promises. Instead of the Promised Land the people are led to the edge of a desert interspersed with bitter lakes.

The opportunity which your "New Times" Dinner affords enables me to perform two services to your fellow Social Crediters in the British Isles. The first is to convey the sense of gratitude all of us feel, not only for the kindness, but perhaps even more for the comprehension, which has prompted the despatch of so many gift parcels. It is difficult to convey to anyone who has not lived in these islands in the nineteenth century, the appalling degradation, which has fallen on us, only mitigated by the sympathy of our kinsmen overseas.

And the second service I must attempt is to impart the conviction which an increasing number, not all Social Crediters alone, hold, that we are the victims of a, deliberate plan to eliminate British ideals.

The King

He then called on Mr. Bruce Brown, well-known lecturer and contributor to the New Times, to propose the health of The King. Mr. Brown said it was not customary to do more than stand when the toast was proposed and drink His Majesty's health, but he felt that in such a gathering as this, we should take time to consider the important part, which the King and the Royal Family played in this Empire of ours. Major Douglas

political events proved conclusively the measure of his genius. In thirty years, in spite of the tremendous entrenched opposition which was organised against him and his ideas, this one great man had inspired a movement which is active in most parts of the world, and which continues to increase in strength from year to year.

Mr. Carruthers then introduced Mr. J. T. Smith, one of the early pioneers of the Social Credit movement in Australia, to propose the toast to the New Times. He regretted the reduction to eight pages, but said it would be impossible to increase the size unless the circulation was considerably greater, and he urged all present to work to that end. He did stress, however, that the paper was being read today by a very important section of the community which included many people in key positions, and because of this he thought it was exerting a greater influence on events than many would have thought possible. The company was then entertained by Mr. Purdy, who sang splendidly, and by Mr. Peter Leonard, who gave us excellent character sketches and a most amusing puppet show

Mr. E. D. Butler

Mr. Eric Butler gave a most inspiring address, which dealt with the impact which was being made on the business community, not only in Melbourne, but in the country district in Victoria. He demonstrated how the prestige of Social Crediters had been slowly built up over the past few years, and as a result there is today a greater awareness of the real dangers of Socialism and the monopoly state. Mr. Butler said he had frequently been invited to address bodies of businessmen, who had been astonished at the information he was able to give them. 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THE COMMUNIST THREAT IN THE NORTH

Although we have no desire to adopt a "We-told-you-so" attitude about the Chinese situation, we do desire to stress the fact that what we have been consistently saying for some time past about the menace of Communism in China, is now being more generally recognised. In an editorial in its issue of July 21, the Melbourne "Age" faces up to the issue in a

manner, which we wish other dailies would emulate.

The "Age" states: "Happenings in China as the Communists tighten their grip discount heavily the earlier consoling notion that they would so arrange matters as to permit business as usual' for Europeans and Americans . . . Unless some wholly unexpected development were to occur in the near future, there seems to be no real obstacle to the Communists penetrating the areas south of the Yangtse still under Nationalist control. The scene unfolding points more strongly than before to the conclusion that Communist China will be closely associated with Soviet Russia. It may be true, as Dr. Evatt warned, that there are dangers in dogmatising about China. But the evidences grow that the new regime, far from having any friendly feelings for Westerners, is actuated by a bitter hostility to British, American and European 'imperialists.' The inference from Communist broadcasts is that the new rulers want China (if it is not already) a close ally and co-partner of Russia.'

The "Age" then goes on to say that the U.S.A. State Department has evidence that the Chinese Communists are totalitarians operating under the direct control of Moscow. As it is now obvious that the Chinese Communists are an important element in the international Communist conspiracy, and not just "agrarian reformers" with a nation-alist background, as Professor Copland has contended, it can be anticipated that the Communist victory in China will result in a drive south into Indo-China and all territories to the North of Australia. This matter is of the most vital importance to Australia. Our survival depends upon a

recognition of this fact.

But it is also essential that it be clearly recognised that the Communist menace in China and the Near North has been deliberately brought about by long-range policies. In order to understand these policies, it is essential to go back at least to the war years, when President Roosevelt, dominated by powerful Zionist groups in the U.S.A., entered into secret arrangements with Stalin which made the postwar Communist successes in Eastern Europe and China possible. In his astounding book of revelations, "The Roosevelt Myth," the American writer, John T. Flynn, exposes how Roosevelt tried to compel Chiang Kai-Shek from fighting the Chinese Communists. American foreign policy —

i.e., Zionist policy— was directly responsible for the Communist victories in China. This is an indisputable fact.

However, in trying to "explain" the facts, it is now a common practice by some apologists to say that the disastrous policies pursued by Roosevelt were merely "honest mistakes." But this theory is not very convincing when it is seen that every "mistake" created the conditions, which the Zionist plotters can explain to controling power still further which the Zionist plotters can exploit to centralise power still further. These plotters seek to establish a World Government, which they will dominate. The threat of Communism in the North will be used to try and persuade Australians to accept more centralised control, both nationally and internationally, in order to meet the threat. This is the technique of the blackmailer and must be recognised as such if we are to survive. Needless to say, we do not expect any daily newspaper to draw attention to this

aspect of the Communist menace!

Landowners' Reafforestation Movement

Notes of talk given by Mr. C. E. Isaac, M.L.C., Hon. Director, "Save the Forests Campaign," to the Victorian Compost Society.

For more than a hundred years we have been cutting down or ring-barking trees in Australia by the million. We have cleared thousands of square miles of country that should never have been cleared.

In recent years we have done a little replanting, but we count our replanted trees by the thousand and the area replanted by the acre. When we say we are planting hundreds of thousands of trees or thousands of acres the numbers sound impressive, but we need to remind ourselves that it takes a thousand thousand to make a million, and that a million trees at the ordinary rate of forest planting will replant less than 21/2 square miles.

During the past eighteen months I have travelled fairly extensively in every State of the Commonwealth, and in every State I have seen large areas of what was once well-wooded country, judging by the stumps and dead trees, now without a single living

Travelling through these treeless farmlands in the heat of summer, seeing the suffering of stock in paddocks that haven't a vestige of shade, seeing the dust rising with every gust of wind, seeing irrigation channels filled with windblown sand, it is hard to understand the short-sightedness of those who grubbed or killed every tree.

Fortunately, many farmers are coming to realise that it is false economy to gain the last blade of grass or grain of wheat at the expense of suffering stock, and soil exposed to the full force of wind erosion.

But the damage has been done. How

can it be repaired?

In our forestlands nature helps reafforestation by sowing seed to replace forest trees that are cut down or killed. The seedlings which result will grow into a new forest if the foresters, helped by public cooperation, can protect them from fire, grazing stock and rabbits.

On cleared farm land the position is different. Nature cannot help by sowing seed, as the seed-bearing trees have been cut down or ring-barked. Young trees must be raised in nurseries and planted out where they are needed. "Well," you may say. "that should be easy: let the Government supply more trees."

I wonder how many people have any idea of the magnitude of the work involved in replanting land that has been wrongly de-

nuded of trees.

In Victoria, about two-thirds of the land is now clear, or nearly clear, of trees. To replant one percent of that cleared land, at the usual plantation spacing of eight feet apart, would take over two hundred million trees. Think of it! To put just one acre of trees in every hundred acres that is at present growing farm crops or grass, in this one small State, would take over two hundred million trees. This statement may be hard to credit, but you can check it quite easily and you will find it correct. What would it take to replant one percent of the cleared land of New South Wales or Queensland? If you reckon at half the usual forest planting, the total will still be hundreds of millions.

What we are doing at present in replanting alienated land is almost negligible. We are making no headway at all. Over Australia we are certainly going back in the proportion of timber on private land, although we are gaining in most States in public appreciation of the seriousness of the position.

Throughout Australia a complete change of outlook towards re-afforestation is urgently needed. Where we have been thinking in thousands we must commence to think in millions, and I believe that the task of growing and distributing the hundreds of millions of trees required is quite beyond the capacity of any government.

What, then, is the solution? In my opinion, the solution is very simple, very inexpensive and entirely practicable. All that is needed is to make the raising of trees for the farm a regular part of the farm routine.

In Victoria there are 70,000 occupiers of the 56,000 square miles of cultivated and grassland. If only a tenth of these occupiers, with average-sized holdings, grew enough trees to plant one acre in every hundred acres of their properties, the total would be twenty million trees. That would be a good start.

The raising of trees from seed would be found surprisingly easy and inexpensive, and the trees would be on hand, without the delay and heavy cost of transport, just when it was convenient to the farmer to plant them.

Advice on raising trees is available from the Forests Department, the "Save the Forests" Campaign, and many weekly journals. It should not be difficult to establish demonstration nurseries and plantations, where field days of instruction could be

held, on the farms of the more enthusiastic growers.

A commencement has already been made on these lines in Victoria, where the "Save the Forests" Campaign in 1948 helped eighty-six Returned Soldier Settlers to start demonstration plantations on their farms. The number will be increased to 200 during 1949, and the work will be continued until there is a demonstration plantation and farm tree-nursery in every district. The Soldier Settlement Commission, the Department of Agriculture, the Forests Commission and the Treasury Department are all helping in this movement.

If you wish to plant trees on your own property, and have not already had experience in raising trees, you will want to know how to make a start. Your first problem will be to obtain seed, and I suggest that you start, right away, to save your own seed, as the best time for saving seed is during the next two or three months. Most of our trees flower in the spring and ripen their seed during the summer. The best time for sowing seed is from September to November. Save seed in the summer; sow in the spring.

I have only time to describe very briefly a simple method of saving one type of seed, so I shall deal with our most valuable tree

family, the Eucalypt.

The seed, which may be as fine as a grain of sand, or more than a quarter of an inch in length, is contained in capsules which vary in colour from green to red, and in size from as small as a sweet pea to as large as a hen egg. The capsules most familiar to you will, most probably, be the small, oval capsules of the Sugar Gum, and the large "gum nuts" of the Scarlet Flowering Gum. Some seed can be reached from the ground; in other cases it may be necessary to climb the tree or use a ladder.

Let us suppose you are able to save seed of the Sugar Gum. Gather a few handfuls of the capsules — or more if desired — taking those that are dark green or bronze green in colour. Seed in the shiny, light green capsules may not yet be ripe, while the hard, grey capsules may have shed their seed. Spread the capsules on a sheet of paper or in a box, such as a cardboard boot box, and put them in a dry, warm place, preferably where the sun can shine on them through glass. Within a week or two in warm, sunny weather, little valves in the end of the capsules will open and, if the box or paper is shaken, the seed will come out. When most of the capsules are open, collect the seed by putting it through a sieve, which will hold back the

The seed is best kept in calico bags, as the cloth helps the seed to dry out, but paper packets or envelopes will do almost as well. If seed which is not thoroughly

dry is stored in closed bottles or tins, it may start to germinate or become mouldy. As a final word of caution — mice are fond of many kinds of seed. Many other native and introduced trees seed freely and are easily raised from seed. Once you have made a start your own ingenuity will help, you in dealing with unusual seeds.

Australia is suffering from great and often unnecessary destruction of her trees. If you own land, will you join in an Australia-wide people's re-afforestation movement, by saving your own tree seed and raising and planting Australian native trees as windbreaks, woodlots, shade for stock, or the protection and beautification of your home? There are few things you can do that will be of greater benefit to yourself, to your district, and, collectively, to the nation.

Man's unconscious wickedness — a gift to perfectly fed healthy supremely tough people of that very archetype of evil, denatured food, which has dulled and devitalised the whole western world. Over and over again this has been accidentally proved. A shipload of white flour and sugar within a year softened the teeth of Tristan da Cunha people who had never previously had any tooth trouble. Ships calling at isolated islands with these products cause annual ill health to the inhabitants. Animals and humans take the line of least resistance. Any creature will take to alcohol. Rats will ravenously drink that dissolver of bones and body, sweet tea, and become neurotic and full of townsman's diseases. Hence the immense importance of sound disciplined tradition in holding a race to the narrow way of health, hardiness, and lively vitality.

Money

How does Money come in here? Money. by making it easy to get non-traditional foods, destroys the foundation of local health and vigour. It is generally believed that Native Races are destroyed because they are not immune to the White Man's diseases such as Measles and Tuberculosis. There is something in this, but far the greatest factor is the alteration in their sound food habits. No one now needs telling that Tuberculosis is a food-shortage disease in other words a deficiency disease in the broad sense; starving Europe has shown that. The same applies to most diseases in their final effect — though possibly when newly introduced they may wipe out a portion of the population. Before we believe this we have much more to learn about complete immunity based on complete feeding. Take the Indians of Alaska. These people, once tough, virile and magnificent, their chiefs living beyond 100 years; are now eaten up by disease; tuberculosis in their teens, with black decayed teeth in childhood, an expectation of life averaging around 30 years. Pushed off their hunting grounds, altered in their

habits, paid money for the skins they trap, and allowed to get drunk by whole families. The money, even a little of it, is an absolute curse. It is much easier to buy the cursed white flour and sugar than to hunt for food." The whole system degenerates, and hardiness and health depart. Taught to wash by foolish missionaries they distribute syphilitic sores over the whole family via the dirty towel. A white woman touring the country by canoe was unable to wash for a large part of a year. Result, her hair became naturally oiled and luxuriant, and her hairdresser complimented her on the absence of dandruff previously a nuisance. We have a lot to learn about real Hygiene. We are grossly ignorant about real inner cleanliness, which sweetens the body from marrow to skin.

Natural Foods

The Western Esquimaux, who migrated to Alaska to avoid debt to a white trader, retain their health better than the Coast Siwash Indians and the Interior Indians. They are a highly cultured race, with complex traditions and a language having more words than ours. They are not so easily deceived as the simpler Indian. Among their foods is a kind of Salmon Cheese made by placing salmon in the cold soil of a riverbank and leaving it to a process of decay for a whole year. After this the whole fish can be eaten, a very special dainty. Such local fermented foods are far more natural and healthy, far less costly, than the terrible dead concoctions advertised on our hoardings as health foods by large commercial companies whose "educated" ignorance of the facts of life and nutrition is appalling to those of us conversant both with traditional good feeding and the latest research. It is truly wicked to cook eggs to death and serve as health food. It is similarly wicked to bake cereals to death and serve as a health food. The Swiss know better. They eat their porridge raw, chew it and enjoy its exquisite live flavour. Such is the curse of large-scale trade, of centralisation of supplies. We pay far more for dead rubbish than the real homemade article would cost. Alaska Indians are rotten with the "bovine type" of tuberculosis, which actually they cannot catch from cows, as there are no cows there. The only" milk they can get is sterilised tinned milk. This makes us ask is the "bovine tuberculosis" so often fatal to English young children really bovine at all? — and is the fresh milk scare all bunkum? So here we have the results of the white man's boasted trade and mass production. Here we see the terrible destruction of local culture, local individuality, local nobility, and local interest; a murder of true humanity. Surely we must realise that the only sound life is based on the limited Region, on the local valley, self-supporting and independent.
