THE FUTURE OF "THE NEW TIMES"

New Type of Journal to be Published

By J. R. Johnstone, Chairman of New Times Ltd,

This is the last issue of "The New Times" in its present form. As indicated in last week's issue, those of us charged with the responsibility of running this paper have decided that new techniques are urgently essential to meet the developing situation. The national and international situation is certainly serious, but it is not hopeless. It is a challenge to us all, and we are asking supporters to re-dedicate themselves to our cause.

Years of experience has convinced us that C. H. Douglas was right when he insisted that quality rather than quantity would be the deciding factor in the crisis in human affairs. Rather than attempt ourselves to change the general climate of opinion by a "popular movement," we must increasingly seek to influence the responsible members of the community. After a great amount of experimenting, we have reached the conclusion that "The New Times" in its present form is not the most suitable vehicle for the presentation of our ideas to those we desire primarily to influence.

What we are proposing is not only the result of our own experience; it is also based upon the experience of publications in other countries. "The New Times" will now be published on a better quality paper, and a much more readable type will be used. The journal will also be in two sections: the News Section which will provide regular readers with an up-to-date news and commentary service, while the Article Section will provide a complete article suitable for passing on to selected people.

As the biggest publishing cost is the setting of the type, the Article Section will, for a start, be published only once a month. But every reader will get two copies of the Article Section, one to keep for himself if he so desires and one to pass on to some selected person. The type of these articles will be kept until readers have indicated how many extra copies they require for distribution purposes. These copies can then be run off comparatively cheaply.

We believe that our new policy will provide supporters with an excellent technique through which they can reach the responsible members of the community. The success achieved by this technique will depend, of course, upon the initiative of individuals. But we are satisfied that the technique is the best that can be devised to meet the present situation. Comments from readers will be appreciated.

From now on no book advertisements will appear in "The New Times," although the News Section will draw attention to any new publications which it is felt supporters should know about immediately. A special book service will be provided in the form of a separate book Bulletin issued from time to time.

NEW POLICY ON SUBSCRIPTIONS

As part of our policy of intensified activity based upon quality, the Board of Directors has also decided that readers can no longer be allowed to waste the time of the hard-working and sacrificing volunteer staff by failing to pay their subscriptions when due. And there is also the added expense.

We stress the fact that no reader who desires to continue getting "The New Times", but who cannot afford to pay immediately when his subscription is due, need go without his paper. All that is necessary is a note explaining the position. But in future, after readers have received their final notice and fail to indicate their

intentions, they will automatically be removed from the subscribers' list and placed on our general contact list. Concessional rates to pensioners will continue as usual. The present situation is too serious for time and money to be spent on trying to "nurse" people along who apparently do not realise the necessity for applying those principles of association, which are the basis of Social Credit. We are fast approaching "the critical moment" which Douglas warned about. Let us close up our ranks and be prepared.

OUR POLICY

1. The support of all policies rooted in the Christian philosophy of freedom and based upon the Moral Law.
2. The preservation of Australia's sovereignty as a part of the British Empire, and the exposure of all internal and external groups, which attack that sovereignty.
3. The preservation and extension of genuine local government.
4. The preservation and strengthening of all Constitutional safeguards for the purpose of protecting fundamental individual rights.
5. The encouragement of all activities designed to bring Governments under more effective control by the electors.
6. The preservation and extension of genuine free, competitive enterprise and private ownership, and opposition to all Monopoly, whether it be "private" or State.
7. The support of a financial policy, which will (a) permit free enterprise to make available to all individuals an increasing standard of living and greater leisure for cultural pursuits, (b) result in no further increase to the community's indebtedness and the sound business practice of gradually reducing existing debt. Recognising that the basis of any sound economy is agriculture, the encouragement of agricultural policies which will ensure the preservation and building up of soil fertility by organic farming and gardening; and the prevention of soil erosion and the protection of forests and watersheds.

Strange Death of Senator McCarthy

Judging from information so far available, Senator Joseph McCarthy died from a liver complaint aggravated by tremendous worry and emotional strain. However, there are a number of sinister aspects to the senator's death, so we are reproducing here a number of pertinent quotations. These quotations, which are taken from an intelligence report supplied by the Christian patriot Gerald L. K. Smith, are not proof of murder, but they are certainly relevant to the world situation:

"McCarthy was murdered". These words constitute the headline of a feature article concerning Senator McCarthy's death, which appeared in the "Manchester Union Leader" (U.S.A.) on May 3, 1957.

"The Wisconsin Senator must be liquidated the way Senator Huey Long of Louisiana was liquidated."—From a feature column in the "New York Post".

"McCarthy must be driven out of American public life completely."—Spoken by W. Z. Foster, head of the American Communist Party.

"This is the room where I heard Louis Bortz boast that the Communist Party leaders had selected him to liquidate Senator Joseph R. McCarthy."—This quotation taken from the "Pittsburgh Sun-Telegraph", July 23, 1953, when a committee witness was directing a legislative investigating committee through the Jewish Cultural been united under one cabinet post, allegedly

James Forrestal, the U.S. First Secretary of Defence after the Armed Services had committed suicide in the same hospital where Senator McCarthy died. Mr. Forrestal was also the object of an intense campaign of scorn and hate promoted and stimulated by the Zionist Jews of America. His death is also a matter, which inspires conjecture, is shrouded in mystery, and stimulated many unanswered questions.

As a military scientist, Mr. Forrestal made a report in which he expressed the deep conviction that America was jeopardising her whole military and economic programme by alienating the Arab-Moslem world in order to pacify the Jewish vote in the great cities. A terrific smear campaign was launched against Mr. Forrestal by Walter Winchell, Drew Pearson and a mad wolf pack of journalistic prostitutes always anxious to please their Zionist-Jew masters. He was committed to the Bethesda Hospital, and according to the reports given out; he leaped to his death from a high floor — a suicide. Men of influence have been bold to say he was pushed. Others believed he was psychologically as-

sassinated by scientific villains who drove him to destruction and made suicide seem to him to be his only way out.

"It is estimated that 50% of the murders are unsolved each year . . . secret poisoning is even now far more frequent than is generally believed."—Taken from an "Associated Press" dispatch dated May 3, 1957, quoting Dr. Theodore C. Osius writing on the historic art of poisoning in the University of Michigan Medical Bulletin.

"In McCarthy's case the Navy doctors say that they don't actually know why he lost his fight to live."—Taken from the "New York Sunday News", May 12, 1957. Feature article by Michael O'Neill.

"It was glandular murder". —These words were spoken by a United States Senator who defined his remark: "Just another way of saying, he was hounded to death by the most vicious evil forces on the face of the earth."

"Men like Senator Joseph McCarthy alarm the Jews . . . They oppose him because their built-in radar detects danger signals."—Taken from a feature article in "Look" Magazine for November 29, 1955.

"Almost 100% of the names tuned up by Senator McCarthy's Committee on subversive activities happen to be Jewish."—B'nai B'rith "Messenger" March 26, 1954. B'nai B'rith is a Jewish Masonic Organisation dedicated to the destruction of Christianity, although some of its members may not realise this.

"I have never been one to make predictions, but when a thing is inevitable, even I can foresee the future. Senator Joe McCarthy has to come to a violent end, Huey Long's death will be serene and peaceful compared with the demise of the sadistic bum from Wisconsin."—The words of H. M. Greenspan, prominent Zionist-Jew and published of the Las Vegas, Nevada,

The organisation, which concentrated on the destruction and elimination of McCarthy, was known as the Committee for an Effective Congress. A list of their contributors

reveals 800 donators, 750 of whom were Jews.

On January 15, 1955, Senator George of Georgia and Senator Ferguson of Michigan revealed that they had evidence to establish the fact that Senator McCarthy's mail was being opened.

One of the loyal friends of the late Senator and his family is U.S. Senator George W. Malone of Nevada. Senator Malone has asked the U.S. Senate to remove from the record the so-called censure resolution, which was passed on December 2, 1954. The Nevada Senator said: "The action was taken during a period of emotionalism and set a dangerous precedent." In offering the resolution, Mr. Malone said: "McCarthy will prove to be greater in death than in life."

Politicians And The Moral Law

An extract from the book, "A Saint In Hyde Park," an impression of Father Vincent McNabb, by E. A. Sidderman:

He was one day asked if he thought the world would be a better place if the governments of countries was in the hands of clerics instead of, as now, in the hands of politicians. He seemed surprised by the question, and after a moment he replied, "I pray to God that this will never be. We priests have a special work to do and we often do it badly, and we have a lot to answer for. Let us keep to our work which is to care for the souls of people, and let the politicians and statesmen look after their job. We have to undergo a special training for our work, but unfortunately it seems that no training is necessary to become a politician. Almost anybody can become one these days if he promises the people the moon.

"The Church teaches the principles of MORAL LAW and the rights of man, and also his responsibilities, and it is for Governments to govern according to these principles. The trouble is that they do not and that is the reason for the present chaos in world affairs. But all the blame must not be put on the politicians. You people who elect them have your responsibility also. If you want a good government you should vote only for those who believe in the MORAL LAW, and see that the LAWS of the country do not contradict that law. Politicians who know and accept good principles may go wrong, but those who do not accept them must go wrong, and you will suffer." And he ended reflectively, "It is becoming increasingly the case that we priests, unworthy though we be, are the only people who can now put up a fight for your rights. We do not sit in Parliament, we do not owe allegiance to any Political Party or Programme, our responsibility is to God and to you so do not ask us to be politicians. Leave us to do our work as priests, and pray for us that we may do it well."

Important Book by British M.P.

Exposes America's Anti-British Policies

In these days when the peoples of the British Empire are expected to accept the carefully fostered myth that the policy-makers of the U.S.A. are the loving friends and allies of the British peoples, it is refreshing news when a member of the British Parliament, and a Conservative member at that, writes a book designed to show that the present desperate plight of the British world is primarily the result of anti-British policies imposed from the U.S.A.

Mr. John Biggs-Davidson, in "The Uncertain Ally", shows convincingly and in most moderate language that the policy-makers in the U.S.A. have consistently used financial policy since the First World War to destroy the economic independence of the British peoples everywhere. Mr. Biggs-Davidson reveals how American "aid", both during and after the war, was in reality designed to further the economic domination of the British.

The author frankly discusses the contribution, which American financial and economic policy made towards starting the Second World War, the hatred of President Roosevelt for the British Empire, how Roosevelt forced the Japanese into the war, and thus provided Roosevelt and his backers with the opportunity to bring America in at a suitable time. Some revealing factual material concerning the relative contributions made by the British and Americans during the last war is given. Mr. Biggs-Davidson shows that the American policy-makers have consistently worked to undermine the British in the Middle East, robbed them of their Persian oil industry, and used the threat of economic sanctions to defeat the British attempt to retake Suez.

Reference is made to Mr. Bernard Baruch's plan for international control of all atomic power; also to other policies for centralising power. In many ways this book leaves much to be desired, and with some of the conclusions we would disagree. But within the framework the author has decided to write this book, he has revealed the major vital aspect of the real international politics of 1917 until the present time. Needless to say, "The Uncertain Ally" has received no press references in Australia—as far as we know—good or bad.

The World Plot Unfolds

The launching of the second Russian satellite has resulted in an intensification of the worldwide propaganda designed to drive the individual into the World State. Although the Communist Empire, in which there is permanent Civil War between the people and their Communist masters, could be collapsed without the West launching one satellite and without a major military struggle, the policy makers in the West are now blatantly advocating that the West must be progressively organised on Communist principles in order to "compete" with the Communists.

The essence of Communism is the centralisation of power. And this is just what the British Prime Minister, Mr. Harold Macmillan, is urging with his plea that the Western countries must make a further sacrifice of their national sovereignties in order to match the Communists. Freedom must be further destroyed and peoples of the Western world become slaves of the technical barbarism, which is a feature of the Communist world. Already this theme has been taken up by sections of the daily press everywhere. The Melbourne "Age" editorial of November 7 provides an example of the current propaganda of the anti-Christ. Sacrifices will have to be made if the West is to find true unity and strength. One of these sacrifices should be in terms of personality". "The Age" also states, "Another sacrifice which all Western countries may have to make is in living standards. If the price of scientific and military equality with Russia is less luxury and more discipline in the West, it will have to be paid."

The most significant feature of the worldwide drive towards centralisation of power and the crushing of the free individual is the fact that there is no indication of just how and when Communism is going to be defeated by the Western nations adopting Communist policies of centralism. It is clear that the sacrifices demanded are not to be temporary. The "competition" we hear so much about is obviously to go on indefinitely. And unless halted it can end only in the World State.

The developing situation is one, which intensifies the challenge to all Church leaders. The basic struggle in the world today concerns the very destiny of the individual. If the Christian Church really believes that it is the God-given right of every individual to possess freedom, to exercise free will, and to develop his personality, then it is betraying its mission if it stands idly by and allows the individual to be forced to sacrifice his freedom in order that power may be organised on a bigger and bigger scale. Christianity is in retreat everywhere today because Christian values are being thrown overboard in this era of "competitive coexistence". Materialism is the new God, which the West is now asked to worship openly along with Mr. Khrushchev and his associates. The world plot is now approaching what could be the decisive stage.

Cancer figures from various parts of the world, including Australia, show quite clearly that the death rate due to cancer is rising at an alarming rate. And there is equally clear evidence available to show that orthodox methods of treatment such as X-ray and surgery are NOT GETTING RESULTS.

A report in the Melbourne "Herald" (September 9) quoted cancer figures for the year 1955, taken from the recently published statistical review of England and Wales. The "Herald" report said that deaths from cancer "continued to increase":

"Cancer was the biggest cause of death, with the exception of accidents, among children and adults up to 44. Between the ages of 45 and 64, a quarter of male and a third of female deaths were due to cancer."

NEW ZEALAND TREATMENT

Among the trained doctors who are now prescribing the Hoxsey chemical treatment in the fight against the cancer scourge is Dr. Eva Hill of New Zealand. oma that was rapidly recurring on my cheek, I registered at the front desk as an ordinary patient. It was decided that my face certainly urgently required local treatment, but it was explained that this was not attempted until my system had been subjected to a period of internal medication. I was therefore issued with a supply of tablets of various kinds, and duly became an accepted patient of the clinic.

For the next week, I spent the days sitting in the waiting rooms talking to the patients—hearing their stories and of their progress while undergoing the treatment, or from new-comers how they had been given up as hopeless after the usual surgery, radium or x-ray had failed to halt the spread of the disease, and how they had heard of Hoxsey through the Defender broadcasts or from some neighbour who had known a cured patient, or, occasionally (but more rarely) from their own medical man. A big man from Calgary, Alberta, told me he had come direct from the Mayo Clinic where he had spent 10 days and been given no hope. He had by chance heard of the clinic and had come to try his luck. Another, who understood much of the false propaganda told me he had decided the clinic must be worth investigating as it was so bitterly opposed by orthodox circles, adding "the most stones are always found under the best apple trees." Another confided in me that the trouble in America was that the people were being slowly starved to death. Later on I came to agree with him, as although there is an abundance of food and wages are high, costs also are high and ordinary people find it increasingly difficult to procure sufficient natural food at reasonable prices to support life with that degree of abundant health that should be every man's birthright.

It was obvious in many patients seeking help that they were hopeless from the start, as they could not obtain the diet necessary to help restore their health. In that week I heard many amazing stories and during my seven months' stay, the waiting rooms never ceased to fascinate me — with the wealth of human material, representing all walks of life, rich and poor, farmers, professional men, accountants, lawyers, teachers, doctors (yes, I actually met three M.D.'s among the patients), naturopaths, chiropractors (all called doctors here and rather confusing to me at first), ministers of all denominations, people of all nationali-

ties, some not even able to speak English, people of every state of U.S.A., Canada, British Columbia, South America, etc. . . There was even a man from the State of Israel who had spent his last penny to reach the clinic. Imagine his delight when he received the customary courteous attention and was sent home with one year's supply of medication. Chinese, Indian, Negro—all were made to feel at home and were among the many extremely grateful patients. A few of the patients were not cancer victims, but had some chronic complaint that had defied all treatment elsewhere. Although the clinic does not really deal with such cases, some were accepted as patients on a trial basis and many were remarkably relieved.

Then I found my way into the External Department where I spent most of my time. Here I saw applied the famous external treatment which orthodox medicine has had to admit does cure skin cancer. After my thirty years of medical practice, I had imagined that nothing I saw could shock me, but a few days in the External Department of the Hoxsey Clinic would shock all but the most callous individuals. Here came sufferers from all corners of the States and Canada, mostly advanced cases of skin cancers—a few had had no treatment, the majority had had full courses of the surgery, radium or x-ray treatment that are the only recognised methods of treatment in orthodox circles, only to have emerged worse than they had been at the start.

Many were absolutely hopeless when they arrived, as they had been so disfigured by mutilating surgery or severe radiation in spite of which their cancer had continued to spread. These pitiful cases demonstrated clearly the shortcomings of orthodox treatment, which had tried only to remove the local effects of what is really a systemic disease.

It is a well-known fact, proved by many authentic hospital records in U.S.A. that the Hoxsey treatment has saved many melanoma victims. I myself have met many of these patients and checked their records. I have also watched others undergoing treatment for their external melanomatous lesions and can vouch for the results.

I will tell you briefly about one or two such cases. First meet Mrs. Hickman. She and I became good friends and spent a week together in Pittsburgh. Her story is well known, as she was one of Hoxsey's early cases. You should hear her tell her own story to get all the detail that she relates so graphically. But briefly, in 1944 she developed a rapidly growing malignant melanoma, proved by biopsy. She had a large hard lump in her groin and was told

by her doctor that she must have immediate extensive surgery, perhaps necessitating amputation at the hip. She refused, as she had always believed it was dangerous to cut out cancer. He told her that, if she did not agree, should not live for long. Her husband was a barber, and next day while shaving a customer, noticed a scar on his neck and asked its cause. The customer told him he had had cancer but that it was now healed. Her husband told him of his wife's trouble and he said he had been cured at the Hoxsey Clinic. The next morning they went to Dallas. She was in great pain and had to be carried in. She had a big black knob in her thigh and the swelling in her groin was larger and she had kernels elsewhere. The clinic did not offer her much hope but took her on trial for six weeks. She started the internal treatment at once and returned three weeks later for the external treatment. She returned at frequent intervals for several months. The mass in her thigh dried up and shrank and finally came out, leaving a large hole that rapidly filled in. That was over ten years ago, and there is no sign of recurrence. She is today a picture of health in spite of her age and always ready to testify as to the efficacy of the treatment.

Mr. Tom Watson, of Boyd, Texas, is another famous case. His case history started when he developed a melanoma on his right shoulder during the last war. He was treated in a Veterans' hospital where the biopsy proved the diagnosis. He went from bad to worse and the hospital doctors said he must have drastic surgery, involving amputation of the whole shoulder or else he would not live three months, and even after operation his chances would be very slight. He decided that if the operation was to offer so little hope of survival that he would rather keep his arm for the short time left to him. He later heard of the Hoxsey Clinic and went there and was accepted as a patient. After a course of internal medication, the melanoma on his shoulder was treated with the famous yellow powder and was soon completely removed. He continued the internal treatment for some time, and returns once a year for a check. He has since been examined at the Veterans' hospital where he was pronounced free of disease. He has, since his cure, married and produced six children. He still has all his limbs intact. The cost to him was exactly nothing, as he had no money when he first attended the clinic. Do you wonder that he is most enthusiastic over the results and always ready to testify as to its authenticity?

Mr. J. W. Anderson of Carlsbad, New Mexico, is another case certified as cured by Hoxsey after he had had extensive surgery in veterans' hospitals, for melanoma of his buttock. He bears many horrible scars, in spite of which the trouble recurred. In his case, the hospital doctors advised further surgery to the extent of hemipelvectomy. This was too drastic for him to consent to. He also heard by accident of the Dallas Clinic and immediately went

The Nameless War, by Captain A. H. M. Ramsay (8/- post free). "The Nameless War" contains a great number of important quotations, many of which are not easily accessible elsewhere. One of the main virtues of this book is that one can disagree with some of Captain Ramsay's forthright opinions, but at the same time thank him heartily for an abundance of factual material of first-rate importance.

there and was accepted as a patient. The outcome in his case was equally favourable. I have frequently met Mr. Anderson. He is in excellent health, carrying on his farm work and a splendid living testimony to the great work of the much-maligned Hoxsey Clinic.

I could tell you many more such cases of melanoma, but will only mention Mr. Grossman, who I came to know very well as I watched the local treatment being applied to his growth. This was a bluish mass the size of a large segment of orange protruding from the angle between his upper lip and his gum and extending the full width of his mouth, so distorting his appearance that it seemed as if his upper lip was thrice its proper size, and completely obscuring his upper teeth. The growth also extended back discolouring the most of the hard palate. In September 1955, at the medical centre in Wisconsin, a biopsy confirmed the diagnosis of melanoma and the surgeons advised immediate extensive surgery as his only hope and said it was a very remote one at that. Realising what the horrible results of the surgery would mean, and deciding against such a living death, he resigned himself to an early end. But he also somehow heard of the despised Hoxsey Clinic and betook himself there at once, arriving there on 3rd October 1955. He was immediately placed on the internal treatment and its accompanying melanoma diet and advised when to return. In his case, local treatment was not begun until seven months had elapsed. Already by that time, much of the discolouration of the hard palate had faded. I was fortunate to watch his local treatment from the start. In his case a combined injection and local powder application was used. This was repeated several times up to 11th June when the growth had shrunk very considerably, and outwardly his facial appearance was back to normal contour, when he smiled his teeth were now visible. He returned home, still taking his internal medication and the diet, and being told to report again in six weeks. He did not return then, but when he finally turned up in September, the growth had shrunk to four small nodules at the gum-cheek junction and he looked and felt well and his various tests were all good. He was doing his usual farm work. He was sent home to report again after three months. A friend reported in November that he is continuing to improve.

There are many cases of cancer of caecum in the clinic records. Mrs. Lessie Hester, of Lubbock, Texas, is another friend of mine with whom I shared those exciting days in Pittsburgh. She had a squamous-celled carcinoma of the cervix proved by biopsy

and classed grade 3. She refused surgery and was treated solely by the Hoxsey internal method. She is free from disease many years later.

Mrs. Harry Johnson, of Kilgore, was another victim of uterine cancer, having adenocarcinoma of the fundus. She also is a living testimony to the efficacy of the treatment, which reaches the growth via the blood stream and by correcting the internal metabolism of the body, enables it to halt the growth, which finally is absorbed and disappears.

We are all painfully aware that cancer is now occurring at an even earlier age. Let me tell you about Pat Addington, aged six.

In February 1955, he started stumbling and falling down, and at the same time he developed an internal squint in his left eye. He became rapidly worse and eventually was diagnosed (by encephalogram, etc.) by a neurologist, as having a tumour at the base of the brain and his parents were told that he could not live more than three months to a year. Several doctors confirmed the diagnosis. He was brought to the clinic in April 1955, carried in, as he had become too ataxic to walk. After two weeks on treatment he became able to sit up alone, but continued very sick for three months. Then he began steadily to improve. He gained weight, his eye improved so that it was freely movable, and his facial paralysis disappeared. I saw this boy on May 28th, 1956. He can now run about like a normal child, and looks the picture of health. He wants to start school. Naturally his mother was delighted when she was told he is regarded as nearly cured and that he need not return to the clinic for another year.

Another interesting man was Mr. Jennings, who had had a leg removed for leiomyosarcoma. He developed metastases in his lungs and was given up for dead by the medical profession. I met him at his annual check up and remember him chiefly for the strange artificial leg he was wearing. The orthodox limb did not please him. He could not sit comfortably in it, so he discarded it and made a working one to suit him better. He remains in good health many years after he should have been dead.

Mrs. Moore, aged seventy-five, was proved by biopsy two years ago to have cancer of rectum. She refused surgery and went straight to Dallas. She is steadily improving in spite of her age.

Joseph Huey was a coloured man who had had several operations for fibrosarcoma in the lumbar region. The trouble recurred and he was pronounced incurable by the orthodox profession. I watched his local treatment for a long time. To me he looked hopeless, but before I left Dallas, he was well on the way to recovery. The growth was checked and the large open lesion was beginning to fill in. A letter last week said that it was healed. His case was a long struggle and he was a wonderful patient, never complaining, although at times he

WITNESS

By Whittaker Chambers

It was the evidence of ex-Communist secret agent, Whittaker Chambers, before the House Committee on Un-American Activities, which caused top Communist espionage agent in the U.S.A., Alger Hiss, to be indicted and convicted on a charge of perjury. Not only the American people but many people in other countries were startled by the disclosure that the official who advised President Roosevelt, helped draft the disastrous Yalta Agreement in 1945, and who was the first Secretary-General of the United Nations Organisation, was a Communist agent.

Before being finally convicted, Alger Hiss, aided by some of the most influential people in America, fought back against Chambers, who was subjected to a whispering campaign described by one prominent American writer as "one of the most repellent in modern history". Chambers replies to this campaign in one of the most important autobiographies of our times. Not only does this book deal exhaustively with the Hiss-Chambers battle before the Committee on Un-American Activities and the Courts; it is a moving human document which explains how Chambers first became a Communist, his work in the secret Communist apparatus, how he met Alger Hiss and worked with him, and how eventually he came to repudiate Communism.

Near the conclusion of his book, Chambers makes one of the most important observations yet made on the Hiss-Chambers case: "No feature of the Hiss case is more obvious, or more troubling as history, than the jagged fissure, which it did not so much open as reveal, between the plain men and women of the nation, and those who affected to act, think and speak for them. It was, not invariably, but in general, the 'best people' who were for Alger Hiss and who were prepared to go to almost any length to protect and defend him. It was the enlightened and the powerful, the clamorous proponents of the open-mind and the common man, who kept their minds shut in a pro-Hiss psychosis, of a kind which, in an individual patient, means the simple failure of the ability to distinguish between reality and unreality, and, in a nation, is a warning of the end." "Witness" must be read and studied by those who want to know the truth about Alger Hiss and his part in the Communist conspiracy in the U.S.A. Every student of Communism and international affairs must have this work on his shelves. No one with an unbiassed mind can read it without realising that Hiss was undoubtedly guilty of the charges made against him.

suffered greatly. He will be another living testimony to the efficacy of the Hoxsey treatment.

The first time I saw Dr. Hoxsey upstairs, was one morning when he had with him distinguished visitors from Europe. He was showing them a series of x-ray films. These were depicting successive stages in the progress of the case of a young teen-aged boy suffering from a sarcoma in the upper arm. The boy had been declared hopeless by thirty doctors in his home country, who had advised amputation of his arm, provided the lungs were not involved. When x-ray showed extensive involvement of both lungs, his case was declared hopeless and ideas of amputation were abandoned. He was brought to the Hoxsey Clinic and steadily improved on the treatment. His progress could be traced in the series of x-ray pictures taken at intervals of some months. The result was remarkable, the signs of the growth steadily diminishing until finally there were no signs left. Such a thing was unknown in medical annals. Dr. Hoxsey demonstrated the case with obvious pleasure, but his face clouded and he asked his visitors in a pained voice, "Why will they not listen? What is the answer? Surely that's proof? What is the answer?" No one could tell him.

I could continue for hours telling similar stories, of cancer of lip, tongue, brain, lungs and other organs, successfully treated, and of others that might have been saved had they been treated earlier. But I must desist and add a few words about the nature of this treatment that is so bitterly opposed

by the A.M.A. and yet so firmly supported by many thousands of cured patients who, in the long run, are the only proof of the efficacy of any treatment.

In 1951, E. V. Coudrey (Trends in Cancer Research) wrote: "One of the twenty chief achievements since 1938 in cancer research is proof that dietary factors influence cancer production." Dr. J. R. Davidson, M.D., former Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine at the University of Manitoba said: "It is no mere coincidence, in my opinion, that cancer in Canada has been steadily increasing during the past few years and that Dominion authorities have found that a large proportion of the Canadian people suffer from malnutrition.
