EDITORIAL

TOWARDS THE WORLD POLICE STATE

The most significant aspect of the recent fantastic events at the modern Tower of Babel, the "United" Nations, was not that Khrushchev took off his shoe to thump his desk, that Castro shouted non-stop for four and a half hours, or that Harold Macmillan made a "wonderful" speech which consisted of meaningless platitudes, but that the creators of "world opinion" widely publicised these and other events as if they were important in the struggle for world power. Their real importance was to mask the fact that the "United" Nations is not at this stage, whatever may be the case in the future, anything more than an instrument being used by those who exercise real power.

Mr. Menzies said when he arrived in New York that he was attending the "United" Nations to see if words meant anything there. How could words possibly mean anything when the votes of those present in this Tower of Babel are not decided in any way by what is said there? At one stage, before Israel was recognised, it was obvious that voting in the "United" Nations would go against the Political Zionists. Those opposed to Israel were not won to the opposite viewpoint by rational argument in the "United" Nations Assembly; they changed their position because enormous pressure was applied by the dollar diplomats.

While the comic-opera performances in the "United" Nations Assembly were receiving worldwide publicity, the meeting of the International Monetary Fund received practically no mention whatever. It is the meetings of the international financiers behind closed doors which are much more decisive than the rantings of a Castro. While Khrushchev undoubtedly regards the "United" Nations as one more forum for his propaganda offensives, we believe it to be dangerously misleading to claim that this shrewd criminal went primarily to the "United" Nations because he believed that he could win there the support of sufficient delegates for his proposals. Khrushchev knew beforehand just what support he was likely to command.

The Communist leader has for example, the measure of that sickening humbug, Nehru, who like his Foreign Minister, is a Marxist at heart. Nehru's motion seeking an early personal meeting between Khrushchev and Eisenhower had the approval of the Communists. This motion,

realities of world politics are very different from the picture presented in the "United" Nations.

Just as individuals in the American State Department were used to deliver China to the Communist Empire, so similar, or the same individuals were used to deliver Cuba to Castro and the Communists. Human Events, the authoritative Washington News-Letter, reports that responsible Belgians claim that it was the American State Department, which forced the Belgians to withdraw prematurely from the Congo. If the International Money Power, with its headquarters in New York, were genuinely opposed to the expansion of International Communism, then we would see enormous funds being made available to fight Communism. But the truth is that every policy assisting Communism receives powerful international support.

If Mr. Menzies wants to make some real contribution to an understanding of the truth hidden by the talk at the "United" Nations, he will cease joining in the clamour for another Summit Conference, which will be another victory for the Communists, and consider the role of some of the "neutral" nations who are now emerging as key instruments in the drive for the creation of the World Police State. For a start he could ponder on the role of that little crook from Ghana, Nkrumah, who has at last been exposed for what he is—a willing stooge for the Communists. Insufficient publicity has been given to Nkrumah's letter to his fellow-crook, Lumumba of the Congo. This letter should be shoved under the noses of all those softheaded Christians who keep saying that "liberation" of the Africans will be a good thing, and who often instance Nkrumah as a sample of a sound African leader.

sponsored by Tito, Communist dictator of Yugoslavia, Nasser, dictator of Egypt, and economically tied to Moscow, Soekarno, dictator of Indonesia, and Nkrumah of Ghana, allegedly had a moral purpose! In all the press commentaries, no questions were raised concerning the role of Tito in the real struggle. Like Gomulka of Poland, Tito remains a dedicated Communist, while at the same time both these Communists receive lavish dollar aid from the directors of dollar diplomacy. But Nkrumah is not only an agent for the Communists; Israel is playing a decisive role in the development of Ghana. And during the recent voting in the "United" Nations, it is significant that Israel has consistently abstained from voting on major issues. Israel is an instrument of Political Zionism and could not survive without the enormous external dollar aid from the U.S.A. In turn Israel is playing a key role in Ghana and other parts of Africa. These are facts, which must be considered in a realistic assessment of the world situation.

CRIMES ACT AMENDMENTS

The Petrov Commission's Report made it clear that there was an urgent need for the Commonwealth's legislation concerning security. The intention of the proposed amendments to the Crimes Act is to assist the proper authorities to try to combat the type of subversion, which is a feature of the Communist conspiracy. This journal agrees completely with the *intention* of the proposed amendments, but without examining the subject in any detail at this stage, states that some of the proposed amendments must be modified, not only to protect the rights of genuinely loyal citizens, but to ensure that the Communists do not exploit the widespread concern about some aspects of the legislation in order to further their own campaign against the Crimes Act.

It is, of course quite hypocritical for the Communists to be waging a nation-wide campaign about people's rights. Rights cannot be discussed without reference to duties and responsibilities. When Communists preach disloyalty to their own nation, and advocate a dictatorship, which would destroy the rights of other people, they automatically forfeit their own rights. The Communist traitor's viewpoint has been put by visiting singer Paul Robeson, who abuses the community which, with all its faults, enabled him to become a big salary earner in the field of entertainment. Upon his arrival in Australia Robeson said that in the event of a war he would be on the side of Soviet Russia—which he believed would win.

We make the final comment that it is going to be most interesting to see how the Federal Government is going to apply its own amendment to the Crimes Act which states that "It is treachery for any person within the Commonwealth, by any means whatever, to assist any enemy of a proclaimed country, whether or not the existence of a state of war has been declared." For example, a senior Minister in the Menzies Government, Mr. McEwen, has been urging that Australia not only do more trade with Red China, but with the whole Communist bloc. The Bureau of Agricultural Science urged that efforts should be made to increase wool exports to Red China at the very same time that the Prime Minister was describing Red China in the United Nations as "the main threat of aggression."

There is no question that increased exports to Red China is increased aid for an enemy. Will the Crimes Act amendment, is passed, be used against all those advocating this increased aid? Or is the dogma of the export drive free from all security restrictions? ist Yugoslavia by an official of the U.S. Bishop's relief organisation.

Mgr. Edward E. Swanstrom said that the U.S. Government treats Yugoslavs who flee their country as "second class refugees from Communism."

He said that such treatment not only deprives them of assistance equal to that given escapees from other Communist countries, but also results in the involuntary repatriation of many of them.

"Fundamentally, it is the failure of some American policy-makers to understand that the basic philosophy of an atheistic Communist State is the same whether it is the Communism of Khrushchev, Mao Tse-tung or Tito."

Mgr. Swanstrom asserted that American help to Yugoslavia helps the Communist government not only to rebuild its economy and military strength, but also "to oppress all who in any way disagree with the regime."

"Refugees from Yugoslavia are victims of economic, political and religious oppression," he said.

"Because the United States Government refuses to consider them on a par with refugees from Soviet satellite areas, countries of asylum such as Austria and Italy are called upon to bear the brunt of the problem," he declared.

"Catholic Relief Services has appealed to the administration on several occasions to liberalise its policy, but without result."

(The refugee programme of the United States provides emergency aid, relief, welfare, local integration expenses and resettlement costs for refugees from Soviet satellite countries. Refugees from Yugoslavia are eligible for only a part of these services.

Since the refugees fleeing Yugoslavia represent the majority of escapees, countries of asylum such as Italy and Austria are reluctant to bear the burden for refugees whom the United States does not recognise as fully eligible for American aid.)

Mgr. Swanstrom continued: "The persecution of the Church in Yugoslavia continues unabated. More than 100 priests are in prison for voicing opinions contrary to the Communist regime. Priests and seminarians are put into military service for three years.

"If a priest attempts to say Mass secretly while in the armed forces he is goaled. Seminarians are usually put in the Navy, where they are far removed from contact with their bishops and church influence.

"No church gatherings of any kind may be held outside

HOW U.S. GOVERNMENT TREATS YUGOSLAV REFUGEES

In spite of the alleged bitter differences between Moscow and Tito, the Communist dictator of Yugoslavia, Tito lost no time in following Khrushchev's visit to the United Nations. The West continues to act in a most hypocritical manner concerning Tito, as witnessed by the recent criticism of the American Government's treatment of refugees from Commun-

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of the church buildings. Even the first Communion class is prohibited from gathering for a breakfast after the service in church.

"The greatest deception is perpetrated on naive visitors who return from Yugoslavia under the impression that there is freedom of religion because the churches are open. The same is true in Russia.

"A few churches remain open for window dressing, but any official who attends a religious service is deprived of his job and means of livelihood."

The Iron Curtain Over America, by Colonel John Beaty. This great classic, beautifully written and produced, has been reprinted in numerous editions since first published in 1951. Colonel Beaty held a key position in the American Military Intelligence Service for five years and has travelled widely. Well documented, with a comprehensive index, this work is an example of truth being stranger than fiction. The history and influence of Political Zionism carefully traced. Essential reading for those who want to understand how the present world situation developed. Price 40/-.

Freedom Wears A Crown, by John Farthing. A brilliant exposition of the necessity of the institution of Monarchy as part of the constitution of the free society. One of the great books of our times. Price 36/-.
