## ECONOMIC WAR UNDERMINING FREE WORLD COMMUNISM'S "SECRET WEAPON"

Speaking in the Australian Federal Parliament on October 19, the Commonwealth Minister for Trade, Mr. John McEwan, made "a fierce, two-pronged attack on U.S. trade policies." (vide Melbourne "Age", October 20). Mr. McEwan expressed concern about a growing restrictive trade sentiment in the U.S.A. The press of October 20 also reported that Britain had expressed "serious concern" to the United States over the threat of possible new American trade restrictions. Opposing proposed trade quotas Republican Senator H. Percy said on October 27 that if a policy of trade restriction succeeded it would undermine support for the U.S.A. in Vietnam. Senator Percy asked: "How long could we expect certain countries whose support is even now subject to internal pressure to continue to support us were we to take unilateral action to disrupt their economic well-being?"

The demand in the U.S.A. for more restrictive trade policies stems from the same basic cause which is forcing all nations to adopt similar policies: a faulty internal financial system which forces each nation to concentrate upon obtaining a "favourable balance of trade" by exporting more than is imported. It is elementary that all exporting nations cannot at the same time have a "favourable balance of trade"; if some export more than they import, then some must import more than they export. The persistent drive towards attempting to solve internal problems through exports leads in fact to economic war between nations. And just as economic war internally fosters centralization, so does economic war between nations foster the campaign for bigger and bigger regional groupings.

### Bigger Trading Units No Solution

In sponsoring protectionist measures one American Senator drew attention to the fact that the European Economic Community is a protection organisation, stressing how it erected tariff barriers against Japanese exports. The Senator claimed that this was one of the reasons the Japanese were invading the American market. The growing internal problems of both the U.S.A. and the European Economic Community provide striking evidence of the fallacy that economic and financial problems can be solved by creating bigger trading units. There is mounting social unrest in France as both farmers and industrial workers riot. After clashes between thousands of car workers and the authorities in Le Mans, the atmosphere was choked with tear gas. There was a general appearance of a battle having been fought. As President de Gaulle uses more and repressive measures, including

efforts to silence the press, the way is prepared for the Communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor to engage in more revolutionary activities.

Across the English Channel in the United Kingdom, Prime Minister Harold Wilson is having no more success

## **RHODESIAN CHIEF WRITES TO U THANT**

**A Rhodesian chief and member of the Chiefs' Council, Chief Simon Sigola, M.B.E., has invited U Thant, Secretary of the United Nations, and President de Gaulle and President Lyndon Johnson to visit Rhodesia to see for themselves how peaceful the country is.**

**Chief Sigola, who is aged 60, is chief of the Sipezini area of Matabeleland. He has been a member of the Chiefs' Council since its inception, and accompanied the Prime Minister, Mr. Ian Smith, to London for the funeral of Sir Winston Churchill. He has also taken part in two world tours by Rhodesian chiefs.**

**He was a member of the Monckton Commission, serves on the Natural Resources Board, and is chairman of the local African Council, at Umzingwane, near Bulawayo. He is also a member of the board of Mpilo Hospital, Bulawayo.**

**He is descended from a long line of Matabele chiefs, who are descendants of the Zulus.**

**The following is the text of Chief Sigola's letter.**

I have seen what Paramount Chief Goraseb of South West Africa says in his letter to U Thant.

We have the same problem here in Rhodesia, how outside people speak about Rhodesia. I wonder whether you would like to come to Rhodesia to see for yourself and speak with people in the streets, and see the Chiefs, because it is the Chiefs that are the leaders of the people. We are disappointed at the overseas people's talk when they have not seen us.

Rhodesia is a peaceful country; there is no war here. The talk of the overseas people is the only thing that could cause a war here. How many people have died in Rhodesia from being killed by violence? How many people have died by violence in Vietnam? Yet they say Rhodesia is not a peaceful country. We know that there is no country as peaceful as Rhodesia. Most other countries are disturbed by troubles.

### **CHIEFS NOT STOOGES**

It saddens me to see that we Chiefs are called stooges of the government. We and our fathers have been Chiefs and the leaders of the people from the beginning. We wish to be taught to be civilized. It is no good our people taking over the government of the country now, like the countries to the north of us. We want to be educated first.

Before this Government came in, people were killed and their houses were burned just because they did not belong to a political party. We in Rhodesia have thatched roofs on our houses. The African politicians used to lock our doors from outside and then set fire to the house and kill the people inside together with their innocent children who knew nothing about politics because they did not agree with them.

The only trouble we have now is from terrorists who come with bombs from China and Russia, Communist

countries with no freedom of speech or opposition parties. We plead with you to come and visit us in our country to see for yourself what a peaceful country this is.

We know that we black people will be able to take over the government when we are civilized enough to do so, but it would be wrong to do so overnight. We know it will take a long time.

Before the white man came, we were fighting among ourselves, we were being killed by diseases and now we have hospitals and clinics and the Mashona and Matabele people are now at peace with each other. There are so many other things by which we are helped by the government. We are helped when there is starvation in the land; we are given work to buy food.

Just look at the countries to the north of us. Nkrumah was the first African President and now he has been chased into the forest in another country. It is all lies that this is a bad country and a threat to peace. Please come and see for yourself.

Why should the United Nations, which is made to keep the peace, come and interfere with us in this country where we are already so peaceful.

In our language, Sindebele, we say "You cannot have two bulls in one paddock." We have our bull in this country, which is our own government. We do not wish to be ruled or interfered with by anyone else.

(Needless to say, the Burmese Socialist and darling of the Communists, U Thant, is too busy attempting to undermine the Americans in Vietnam to bother about a Rhodesian African who merely asks that he and his people be left in peace by the forces of international revolution.)

## PREMIER MANNING OPENLY RENOUNCES SOCIAL CREDIT

In a recently published book, *Political Realignment: A Challenge to Thoughtful Canadians*, Premier Manning of Alberta, Canada, has in effect openly renounced Social Credit. Mr. Manning has confirmed what Mr. Eric Butler pointed out in his article, "The Tragedy of Social Credit", published in our July issue: that having sabotaged any realistic effort to introduce Social Credit policies provincially, claiming that Social Credit could only be introduced at Ottawa, Mr. Manning did little to help the On-to-Ottawa movement. Now after twenty years of futile and destructive effort to advance Social Credit through party politics at Ottawa, Mr. Manning openly rejects Social Credit as an effective national force and suggests that Social Crediters join the Federal Conservative Party as part of an endeavour to obtain a realignment of the party political structure in Canada. We trust that Premier Manning's clearly enunciated policy will be carefully heeded by those few remaining Australian advocates of attempting to advance Social Credit through yet one more political party. It is, of course, too much to expect Mr. Manning to apologise for having helped to divert Canadian Social Crediters into the wastelands of party politics for twenty valuable years, or to admit that events have proved the author of Social Credit, C. H. Douglas, correct. But at least his open rejection of a national Social Credit party should help to clear away some of the barriers to genuine Social Credit activities in Canada.

Social Crediters will have little quarrel with Mr. Manning's thesis that in modern society the self-reliant individual is losing control over his own destiny, or with Mr. Manning's general political philosophy which he terms "Social Conservatism". There is also much to be said for his concept of a clear-cut realignment between political parties. But all policies are rooted in philosophies, and any philosophy of expanding individual freedom, with individuals in effective control of their own institutions, requires a drastic modification of current financial and economic policies. If Mr. Manning can help develop a national Canadian Conservative Party, which will adopt such policies, this will be some atonement for his perversion of Social Credit for the last twenty years.

### WHEN WILSON WAS IN A PANIC

Speaking in Parliament of the talks aboard H.M.S. Tiger, Mr. J. H. Howman, Minister of Information, who accompanied the Prime Minister, paid tribute to Mr. Ian Smith's unfailing courtesy, his calm and his quiet, yet unbending resolution and unflinching courage in the face of considerable pressure and the greatest provocation on occasions.

He asked that Members should consider the build-up for this meeting, the setting and the drama of the occasion.

"The ancient fortress of Gibraltar, the impressive dignity, the competence and the hallowed traditions of the Senior Service. All these things were no doubt designed to awe, perhaps to overwhelm.

"On the conduct of discussions—I find it impossible to describe them as negotiations in the accepted sense of the term—the Victorian paternalism, condescension, sometimes benign, but at other times insufferably arrogant.

"Perhaps this is understandable, for from the British point of view had we not had the impertinence, the audacity to defy, indeed to challenge the power and the authority of Her Majesty's Government and were we not the first of our kind for 200 years to do so?"

Reading the British version of events, one could not but be appalled at the misrepresentations that had occurred said Mr. Howman, who gave Parliament examples.

At the resumption of the debate at 9.30 p.m. on December 3 "an entirely different and sinister atmosphere surrounded the talks."

"We came into the Admiral's day cabin to find Mr. Wilson in an absolute fury. I have never before seen a man indicating such vicious malevolence as this man did at that moment.

"It was quite the most extraordinary change of mind . . . and for hours this went on. At first Mr. Smith broke in, in his rather usual way, saying 'What's bitten you, we have agreed to this' "

Mr. Howman went on: "We came to THIS, as it eventually developed: '*You will sign these documents, I will not have Britain humiliated, you will sign before you leave this ship*', said Mr. Wilson, and back again came Mr. Smith's answer, again and again and again, '*I have told you I will take this back to Salisbury, I will give it a fair run. If you want an answer now it is no, it is no, it is no, it is no.*'"

Said Mr. Howman: "This extraordinary man and this extraordinary change, from where one had a fairly amicable meeting until this evening.

"I believe something happened to Mr. Wilson that evening, that he received a call from either his own Government or from another source, that he was put in a spot, and I am convinced to this day that he was petrified that we should leave the ship without submitting ourselves to his jurisdiction.

Something frightened him, and I do not know that anyone can ever explain his attitude, except as one of a fearful, panicked man who, in seeking to ride a tiger, was trying to pull us on too".

## AMERICAN MOTHERS PROTEST TO PRESIDENT JOHNSON

Several months back the "Mothers Crusade for Victory Over Communism," an American organisation, wrote to President Lyndon Johnson seeking to present petitions dealing with American policies concerning Communism. The mothers' letter stated: "The war in Vietnam, as well as the Moscow and Peking directed Communist subversion and revolution throughout the entire world, is of utmost concern to the women of our great republic, and every loyal American woman supports our American fighting men in whatever part of the world they are stationed." The letter expressed confidence that the President would be "interested in the concern of mothers and wives whose sons and husbands are risking their lives in the fight for freedom against atheistic Communists," and that he would "welcome the opportunity to confer with us."

The women's letter was ignored. The women then followed up with a telegram urging advice. This produced an evasive reply from a White House official who said that the President was unfortunately too busy to see the mothers and wives. As has been observed since, the President can find time to meet Communists and similar people.

The real reason why President Johnson did not want to meet the mothers and wives of American servicemen was because they wanted to raise some "controversial" issues. They wanted to protest against trading with the Communist enemy killing their sons and husbands. They wanted to raise questions, for example, about a licence issued last January by the American Department of Commerce, authorising export of technical data to enable a U.S. firm to build six fertiliser plants in the Soviet Union. The American women are also interested in the admission by Robert McNamara that shipments of war supplies, including fertiliser, were coming into North Vietnam from Soviet Russia through the port of Haiphong.

It is no wonder the President of the United States did not want to meet American women!

### A LETTER TO THE EDITOR WOOL PROMOTION

Sir,

Speaking of the effect of tariffs on wool men, Sir William Gunn said recently, he hoped the wool industry had not reached the situation where it would have to ask the Government for subsidies: what was needed was a higher price. He intimated his willingness, however, to accept a subsidy for 'wool promotion'. Recessions (caused by restriction of money flow) in England, U.S.A., and Germany, had lowered wool prices, he said.

With all the evidence of insufficient purchasing power relative to goods for sale in both home and overseas

markets, does it not dawn on Sir William that it's the whole trouble? 'Promotion' cannot provide purchasing power for would-be buyers short of cash. This can be done only by Governmental change of policy. Within the present frame work there is no 'practical solution', unless massive creation of credit for war is acceptable. We can't solve the buying problems of overseas customers except by having Australian Governments demonstrate how it can be done in our home market.

## TOWARDS CENTRALIZATION OF WORLD

### POWER

"This centralization of the power of capital is going on before our eyes, both directly in the form of money trusts and bank amalgamations, and indirectly in the confederation of the producing industries representing the capital power of machinery. It has its counterpart in every sphere of activity; the coalescing of small businesses into larger, of shops into huge stores, of villages into towns, of nations into leagues, and in every case is commended to the reason by the plea of economic necessity and efficiency. But behind this lies always the will to power, which operates equally through politics, finance or industry, and always towards centralization."—C. H. Douglas in *Economic Democracy* (1920).

It is now nearly half a century since the author of *Social Credit* warned of the inevitable disastrous results for civilization if a policy of centralizing power was not halted and reversed to the point where the individual had effective control over his own affairs. But the will to power has continued to operate through politics, finance and industry with the result that the proceeds of centralization in all spheres have been intensified. This process producing increasing tensions, both nationally and internationally. The organization of industry into international cartels and nations into common markets does nothing to solve the problems, which are used to justify the centralization. And so the call goes out for still bigger economic and political units. The end result must be the complete centralization of power on a world scale. This is the ultimate objective of International Communism.

than President de Gaulle. On October 24 Mr. Wilson told the British Parliament that he had evidence of a Communist plot to wreck Britain's economy. We have no doubt whatever that there is a Communist plot. But this plot is only possible because of Mr. Wilson's own wrecking policies. C. H. Douglas always stressed the point that the Socialist Parties are the main chosen instrument of International Finance. Mr. Wilson's principal "adviser" is the subversive S. Warburg, influential international financier who strongly urges that the United Kingdom become a member of the European Economic Community. Mr. Harold Wilson's internal restrictive financial policies are allegedly designed to help Britain's export drive. It is elementary commonsense that if the British cannot solve their financial and economic problems while they still have the right to control their own affairs, they are certainly going to have no chance whatever of solving them as members of the centralised European Economic Community.

### **Power Groups Agree**

It is clear that there is unholy alliance between all the main international power groups, including the Communists, and that in spite of their differences they are determined to drive the whole of mankind into the One World State, which must be an absolute tyranny. The British Empire was a major barrier to this concept, and it had to be destroyed. The Communists were given vital assistance by the international financiers. When the campaign to drive Britain into the Common Market first opened, it would have been too blatant to admit that this policy was directed at wrecking the British Commonwealth. So all kinds of nice words were spoken. Mr. Wilson also used these words originally; he was a great Commonwealth man, the interests of the Commonwealth must be protected, British agriculture must be protected, and of course there must be no interference with sterling as an international currency. But under subversive pressures Mr. Wilson has progressively retreated, and in a long statement in the British House of Commons on October 27 the incredible Foreign Secretary, Mr. George Brown, who usually manages to fall flat on his face late every day made it clear that the Socialist Government would willingly eat all their promises to be permitted to join the European Economic Community.

### **British Nations Could Have Civilization**

Anyone who wishes to study the Big Idea behind contemporary international power politics can do no better than study papers like "The Australian", a "national daily" launched by Mr. Rupert Murdoch with large financial backing. It would be instructive to learn how many hundreds of thousands of dollars this revolutionary paper (which appropriately carries a red map of Australia on its front page every day) has lost to date in its subversive campaign in Australia. In its issue of October 28, Foreign Editor Robert Duffield writes that "The Commonwealth

IS breaking up . . . and Britain is now too far along the road to Europe to turn back . . . The world of trade is fast splitting into blocs and everyone knows Britain must get into one of them, or sink." Britain's only hope of not sinking is to keep out of any of these centralised blocs, and to demonstrate in co-operation with the members of the old British Commonwealth that there is a way out of the growing threat to Civilisation. A group of sovereign, independent nations, possessing between them vast natural resources, a resourceful people with a common background and traditions, could evolve financial and economic policies, which would enable them to use them to their mutual advantage without any nonsense about "fighting" for markets.

### **Helping the Communist Enemy**

Unless the nations of the free world can bring an end to the growing economic war between themselves, an economic war which is not only driving them into surrendering their sovereignties to regional blocs, the first step on the road to the World State, they will also succumb to the increasing temptations to attempt to solve their internal problems by increased exports to the Communist bloc. The recent Australian trade agreement with Bulgaria is evidence of the shape of things to come. There is no evidence that Bulgaria can provide anything, which Australia really wants. But, of course, Bulgaria does provide what the controllers of Australian financial and economic policy say Australia desperately requires: another export outlet. Bulgaria and other Eastern European Communist bloc nations are engaged in maintaining the strength of the Viet Cong in Vietnam. All free world exports to these Communist nations therefore assists the enemy against whom Australian troops are fighting and dying. But this fact is brushed aside by those who claim that Australia and other free nations have no other alternatives.

The internal economic and financial policies of the free world are the Communists' principal "secret weapon." And that is why Communist agitators never really attack those policies. They know only too well just where these policies lead. The free world cannot win in the struggle it is waging while it adheres to present policies of finance and economics. Failure to come to grips with these policies will mean the end of Civilisation.
