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"Inspiration Is Not Bounded By Time Or Distance"

Numbers were down slightly at the Annual "New Times" Dinner on September 17th, but the intensity of feeling, which dominated this unique Social Credit function, was like a brilliant searchlight penetrating the darkest of nights. Judging the mood of the evening, Mr. Eric Butler, in a fighting address, quoted from several messages as texts for his message. Veteran Queensland supporter Vince Bermingham and his wife June said "There is not enough darkness in the whole world to put out the light of one small candle." Mrs. Beatrice Palmer, of "Housewives Today" and her husband Jim said that "It is a mistake to spend too much time guessing what will happen, but we must be ready, and fortunately, our plans are flexible. Small forces are not thrown into disarray, as are the battalions of the megalomaniacs, "while Mrs. Mary Blakey of The British Housewives League observed, "Inspiration is not bounded by time or distance, Neither is it bounded by death."

There was inspiration in abundance, not only at The New Times Dinner, but also at the other events of the 1976 National Weekend of the Australian League of Rights.

A cable from Mr. Don Martin National Director of The British League of Rights, asked the Chairman to read verses two and three of the National Anthem as his message. The words of these verses are most appropriate at present. Verse two reads:

"O Lord our God arise.
Scatter our enemies
And make them fall.
Confound their politics
Frustrate their knavish tricks,
On thee our hopes we fix,
God save us all."

Typical of the messages received from country supporters unable to attend, was one from Mr. Bill Petering of Murton, Victoria, who said. "Seasonal conditions, and the daily feeding of stock, make it impossible for us to come. But we do hope that you have a fruitful weekend, and that it is an inspiration and enjoyable occasion for all who attend."

The many messages from around the Crown Commonwealth were a manifestation of the growth of a genuine international family. As both Mr. Ron Gostick and Mr. Pat Walsh from Canada stressed in their messages the constructive work being done through the World Anti-Communist League by The Crown Commonwealth League of Rights, it was appropriate that guests at the Dinner had the opportunity of obtaining advance copies of the historic World Anti-Communist League report on how to halt the financing of economic blood transfusions to the Communists. Early issues of the second edition of Heritage were also available.

The appeal for a thought for embattled Rhodesia, from Dr, Ian Anderson of The Candour League, moved everyone. There were some damp eyes when a recording was played of a poem, Wisdom of Years, by Major the Rev. John Fall, Rhodesian Army Corps of Chaplains. This Anglican Priest, who has lived in Rhodesia for twenty-seven years, makes a special appeal to his clerical brethren overseas. As one guest said, "That message should be played in every Church throughout Australia. It might shame some of those who have been supporting the World Council of Churches to finance Communist-backed African terrorists."



The toast to The New Times, moved and seconded by two young Western Australians, Murray Jorgensen and Paul Hamilton, was a manifestation of the life and vitality of the League of Rights movement. Mr. Jorgensen, editor of Heritage, the new quarterly journal of The Australian Heritage Society, thanked older supporters for having carried the torch for many years, while Mr. Hamilton told of how his introduction to the League had brought him to a realisation that Christianity was of vital importance.

The National League Seminar was again well-attended, a fact which was commented on by a newcomer, who observed that it was unusual to find that on a pleasant Saturday Spring afternoon, with Melbourne football finals being played, so many people prepared to meet to hear serious national and international questions discussed.

The first Seminar Paper, presented by Brigadier R. Eason, on a realistic defence programme for Australia, made a tremendous impact on those who heard it and the League is taking immediate steps to have the Paper printed in booklet form for nation-wide distribution. It will be a most opportune brochure. In his Paper Mr. Jeremy Lee stressed that a realistic

military defence programme was impossible unless realistic financial and economic policies were adopted. He thoroughly analysed the disastrous Lynch Budget, predicting that it must lead Australia closer to a state of revolution. Mr. Eric Butler gave the last Paper, "Australia's Front Line in Rhodesia". Mr. Butler's Paper was chaired by Mr. John Turner, Treasurer of the Australia-Rhodesia Society. The Seminar finished on a high note with a message to the Rhodesian Prime Minister, Mr. Ian Smith, apologising for the disastrous policy of the Fraser Government. There were heavy literature sales at the Seminar and many new contacts made.

The National Action Seminar on the Sunday was packed for this all-day programme. The mood of the Seminar was serious but determined. A wide variety of reports were presented, with the highlight being a realistic assessment of the critical situation by National Director, Mr. Eric Butler. Mr. Butler warned that unless the League could open new initiatives to meet the situation, it was going to face a desperate position in 1977. He then unveiled several new programmes and concepts, which were greeted with tremendous enthusiasm. A veteran supporter, attending his first National Action Seminar, said at the conclusion, "If only I had known in the past the significance of this national function, I would never have missed one. I thought that this was merely a type of social get-together. But here we got down to the real meat of the situation. It was most inspiring to get the national picture of the League and to realise its growing influence. My advice to all actionists, and would-be actionists is to make certain not to miss next year's National Action Conference."

The National Secretariat Conference of the League took place on the Friday of The New Times Dinner and agreed that the League was now facing its biggest challenge. But it was agreed that the League was never better equipped to move forward. The 1976 National Weekend of the League will go down in history as one of the great watersheds of the League. As Mr. Eric Butler predicted, "1977 will be the biggest test we have had to face. By the time we meet here again next year we may have a clearer picture of our future."

'GOD'S SERVANT — THE QUEEN!'

In proposing the Loyal Toast, Mr. Robert Hunt said:

In proposing the loyal toast this evening, I would like to indulge you in a little bit of history and a little bit of education (for those who don't already know it) and put the bits together with a central moral for the world of today.

The monarchial system as we are fortunate enough to know it, had very real beginnings. History records that real Monarchs were never made, or elected by some democratic process. Righteous Kings and stable authority never just happened. The most powerful leaders never just stepped into the position and established a dynasty of peace and prosperity.

The first Kings recorded in history inherited their authority, which was derived from the divine king or God of the Land. In the classical Greek language, Basileus denotes the legal hereditary ruler, guiding the life of the people by his justice or injustice but contrasted with the tyrant or usurper. Later the Kings powers become one of benefactor whose will was law leading up to the idea of the divine-kings in Alexander and the Caesars.

Looking at the history of old Testament Israel, the early tribes were ruled by the clan Patriarch and we see Moses leading the Israelites out of Egypt, succeeded by Joshua in what was a virtual theocracy, and a non-hereditary leader, elected by divine calling, and acknowledged by the people. During those times when Israel had turned from God to idol worship, clan leaders like Gideon were called on to rule. There was a degree of social chaos attributed to the fact that there was no real King over Israel. His son Abimelech seized temporary power and kingship after him. Later SAUL was made King under Samuels priesthood as an expedient move to form an army against the raiding Philistines, but he never did quite establish a dynasty, being a warrior at heart.

David, however, was eminently successful and was ever afterwards regarded as the ideal King, establishing a dynasty that lasted for over 400 years until the break-up of the Israelite state in 587 B.C. The security of David's dynasty seems to have been based largely on what has been called the Davidic covenant. David's' role assumed something of the priest-king style of the ancient Jebusite Kings, whose priesthood extended back to the time of Abraham. The main responsibilities of the King were the maintenance of righteousness, with the duty not only to act as judge but to preserve justice and proclaim the law. The failure of many Kings, during the time of the Israelite State, to live up to the ideal however, tended to cast the hope for a righteous ruler more and more into the future.

It is interesting to note that History records the fact that kings and kingdoms failed when the spiritual fibre of the nation was weakest

With the fall of the southern kingdom of Israel and later the failure of Zerubbabel to restore the dynasty to the throne of the Israelite state, the expectation crystallised into what is technically known as the Messianic Hope.

In the early kingdom it is interesting to look at the ministers of the king.' These included the Captain of the host, the Scribe, and the Recorder plus sundry others. The Recorder was literally one who caused to remember, and was a chronicler of state events. We cannot be certain of the exact terminology, but it appears that the Recorder held the advisory and executive position of a Prime Minister, -quite a powerful position for a Kingly servant!

So thus developed the authority of Kings based on spiritual principles and culminating eventually in the ideal pinnacle of that wonderful document we know as the Magna Carta.

But alas, in a short 700 years we have seen the eventual erosion of that majestic office, until we are faced with the prospect of a Kingdom and Crown robbed of its powers of AUTHORITY, LEADERSHIP and JUSTICE. These qualities

which were guiding our forefathers are under attack. Likewise, the spiritual strength of our nation has been sapped away and it no longer up-holds God's commandments.

These qualities, which God has shown us, through the events of history to be necessary for our survival, have been plundered, defaced, and turned about until they reflect only mere man's attempt at a secular, bigoted, and self-centred

set of rules.

The Kingly servants, the Recorder and the Scribe are becoming the usurpers, by threats of menace and open slander.

So I pray that God will forgive us at this time. I pray that you will join me now in upholding God's servant - THE QUEEN!


"I direct this message to all those veteran League supporters in Australia and throughout the world:

"Make The Word Flesh"

In seconding the toast to The New Times, Mr. Paul Hamilton said that he considered it a privilege to do so, "especially when I've had a mere two years of association with the League of Rights. I feel like a sapling amongst giants."

Mr. Hamilton continued, "A book called None Dare Call It Conspiracy first aroused my interest in the League of Rights. Before that I was something of a Socialist, drifting and accepting without question popular appeals and arguments. 1 voted Labor and fully agreed with what Whitlam did when he was elected. Well, None Dare Call It Conspiracy and a few discussions with Mr. Ray White changed all that. In retrospect, I think that I was rather compulsive in the way I jumped at the League, but it seemed to 'ring true'. And the writings of C.H. Douglas, which seem unassailable, back this up.

"However, I still felt that there were problems. Certainly world events were explained. I could see what was happening and I understood what was physically required to reverse the course of events. But it was still an empty shell. Gradually I have come to realise that it is not just a case of who has the most conservation, the most guns or whatever. I started to ask myself what's man all about. Why are we all here? Is man just a product of chance - a higher development of primeval ooze? Or is there a higher form than man? Creation or chance?

"So being of sound mind and body — and with two years of university education! — I came to believe that Christianity and creation hold greater sway than chance. One only has to read Wurmbrand, while Solzhenitsyn puts across vividly that there is a great force behind the evil being committed against mankind. Perhaps this extract from The Bible -- Ephesians 6-12: 13 - is appropriate: 'For our struggle is not against the rulers, against the powers, against the world forces of this darkness, against the spiritual forces of wickedness in the

heavenly places. Therefore, take up the full armour of God, that you may be able to resist in the evil day, and having done everything to stand firm.'

"To me, those passages express the fundamental concepts which the League of Rights supports. And it is to this end that I am seconding the toast to The New Times which to me makes sense of such phrases as 'Where there's a will there's a way', and 'Make the word flesh'."

"The Prelude To the Most Intense and Rewarding Growth'

Replying to the toast to The New Times, Chairman Jeremy Lee drew attention to the significance of the 30 years since the first New Times Dinner was held. He pointed out that Christ's ministry started in His 30th year, and that in the three following years the whole teaching of Christianity was developed. The League was a body of individuals in service — loyal to the One "Whose service is perfect freedom."

Mr. Lee said that he believed the 30 years development of the League, with the refinement of its programme of social dynamics, was the prelude to the most intense and rewarding growth in the period ahead. The preparation, which had gone into equipping the League to meet future demands, was the achievement of the many pioneers — often unsung — who had had such vision in the early days.

Mr. Lee said that the many messages coming in from all over the world to the 30th New Times Dinner had significantly created a theme peculiar to this dinner - a theme which stressed that the darkest moment was often the moment pregnant with the greatest hope - a paradox at first sight, but true nevertheless. This paradox was more remarkable for the fact that Douglas himself had first drawn attention to the fact that such a moment would come. Quoting from the 11th chapter of Douglas's first major work - Economic Democracy, Mr. Lee quoted the author's description of a situation in which the forces of evil and compulsion seemed so monolithic and embracing as to be invulnerable. The danger of such a moment was in the effect on ordinary individuals — tending to silence even the most dauntless. But Douglas had warned against conceding to the visible evidence. This was a form of idolatry. Visible evidence was only part of the truth. History could not be seen, but had a direct bearing on events. Spiritual force and faith were materialistically intangible, although the most vital dynamics in the existing situation. Mr. Lee quoted Douglas further:

"A closer examination confirms the statement already made that a pyramidal administrative organisation, though the strongest against external pressure, is of all forms the most vulnerable to disruption from within."

Already more people were prepared to disrupt attempts to interfere with their freedoms. The League had, through its 30 years of development, built the right weapons for this growing resistance to organised tyranny, and the period ahead dark and tortuous though it would undoubtedly be — would provide the events in which the demand for such weapons would escalate to a final irrestable turning point.

"May This Dinner Confirm Old Friendships and Encourage New"

Mr. Jeremy Lee said that the many messages received at the "New Times" Dinner was a special feature, helping to cement the concept of a family. He felt that the message from veteran British Social Crediter, Mrs. B.M. Palmer, editor of "Housewives Today" was an excellent introduction for other messages: "What will defeat them? Events". We all know who said that (Douglas). It is a mistake to spend much time guessing what will happen, but we can be ready, and fortunately, our plans are flexible. Small forces are not thrown into disarray as are the battalions of megalomaniacs, "The friends thou hast, and their adoption tried, Grapple them to thy soul with hoops of steel' said Polonious. May this Dinner confirm old friendships and encourage new."

Whilst you are debating the defence of Australia, please give a thought to us who are under physical and psychological attack from almost the entire world, including the active assistance of our enemies in Mozambique by the Australian Government; and include us in your plans for a more militant anti-communist force - spiritual, moral, economic and physical - that could arise from the peoples of the Southern Hemisphere who remain as yet relatively untainted by the present spinelessness of the Western World in its own defence.

We remember at this time the magnificent contribution made by ANZAC forces in defence of the Mother Country in two world wars. Is it too much to expect that some of that same spirit will come to the aid of one last small remnant of the erstwhile British Empire; and that perhaps we may yet welcome an Australian Expeditionary Force in Rhodesia?

Basic Fund Set at \$45,000

The National Secretariat of The Australian League of Rights has decided that in view of the rapidly deepening crisis situation, both national and international, the League's Basic Fund of \$40,000 for the past two years must be lifted to \$45,000 for 1976-77. The Secretariat anticipates that with this Basic Fund, the League can build its total expenditure to meet the heavy demands over the coming twelve months. Only a small increase in salaries for full time League officials is planned. There are increasing operational costs resulting from inflation. With an increase of a mere \$5.000 to the Basic Fund, the League is confident that it can finance a massive expansion programme over the coming twelve months.
