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Thought for the Week: 'The wind always blows from the far left': Lenin in Zürich by Alexander Solzhenitsyn

KLAUS SCHWAB, YOUNG GLOBAL LEADERS, & AUSTRALIAN POLITICIANS By Arnis Luks

Over 40 years ago my brother and I trekked north for a month, driving his XC Alan Moffat Special 302 V8 Falcon towards the northern parts of Queensland. I remember it quite vividly as we covered, for us both, unknown parts of Australia's east coast and the hinterland. It was around June and from the northern parts of New South Wales going north the weather was fine and everywhere was lush with growth. It seemed as if every time we worked our way through another mountain range there was another rural town, another giant cane field or other tropical agricultural pursuit, and then another PowerStation. I gathered that the cane held a dual purpose, in that burning off the residual growth and part of the husk prepared it for sugar extraction and the heat energy created from this pre-refining was converted into electricity. The resourcefulness of the locals with their energy, drive, and their ease of adapting to local circumstances and their semi-tropical climate conditions impressed me.

Looking further south, another quite vivid memory was the tunnel opened with picks and shovels through a hill to redirect water towards a gold panning location in Victoria. Those miners saw fit to hand dig through several hundred metres of hill to complement their efforts in panning, sifting through the tailings washed down by the seasonal creek. I duck-walked through that tunnel of several hundred meters, which was completely dark and at its narrowest point providing only just sufficient clearance for me to crouch right down to get through, only using the back of my hands (above and in front) as my guide. These two vivid memories reinforce what the 'driven' individual working in community can achieve, which at times is a huge undertaking.

When Australia was colonised, there were no huge fields of agriculture, fences, roads, nor tunnels, nor buildings, nor any type of infrastructure to speak of. The Europeans that arrived started from scratch. They had their initiative, cultural inheritance, their know-how, and an egalitarian Spirit due to the stark necessity to collaborate to tame this rugged land. Nowadays, as I trek around Australia, even across the deserts, outback or semi-remote Nullarbor, I find regular comfort stations, eateries and accommodation. 'Bloomin luxury' you might say, and that is the truth of it.

Australia has often been referred to as the lucky country. We have nearly every mineral required by an industrialised nation. We have sufficient coal, shale oil, shale gas, coal seam gas, natural-gas and oil reserves to supply the whole world for hundreds, if not thousands of years.

During his 30-40 years of also trekking around Australia, Jeremy Lee never shied away from declaring that our primary production was sufficient to feed, house and cloth a population twice the size of our current 27 million. With modern industrial technology, and the unrealised mineral reserves that Australia hold, this would be a modest or reserved declaration. Yet psychologically, or more realistically spiritually, Australians have been conditioned into thinking we are defeated and ripe for re-colonisation by another worldly power. This demoralisation of Australia's national psyche has occurred across this past 60 years due to the pursuit of a definite predetermined long-term policy objective. It hasn't occurred by chance.

I recently read the booklet 'Boche and Bolshevik' by Nesta Webster, which revealed the secret German banking interests behind Vladimir Ilyich Ulyanov, better known as Vladimir Lenin, and the Russian Revolution. Some media outlets are currently eulogising Lenin, however Nesta Webster reveals that he was on the payroll of German banking interests since 1915 and sat in Zürich, Switzerland while all the revolutionary ferment was being built up by others. He parachuted into Russia at the critical moment to do the bidding of his German banking masters, surprisingly able to travel unhindered by train across the European war zone front-lines.

Following the parliamentary resignation of Bernard Finnigan on 12 November 2015, Peter Malinauskas filled the casual vacancy in the SA Legislative Council by a joint sitting of the Parliament of South Australia on 1 December 2015. Two months later, Premier Jay Weatherill indicated that Malinauskas could enter the Cabinet of South Australia in an early 2016 ministerial reshuffle, with media speculation and internal party talk suggesting Malinauskas could potentially become the next Labor Premier of South Australia, entering the <u>House of Assembly</u> through preselection as the next Labor candidate in Labor's safest lower house seat of Croydon, with claims that incumbent Michael Atkinson "has long been willing to vacate his seat to Malinauskas if he ever wanted it". Atkinson announced in February 2017 that he would be retiring from parliament as of the 2018 election. Malinauskas won the House of Assembly seat of Croydon at the 2018 election.

Malinauskas served in the Cabinet of South Australia in the Weatherill Ministry between January 2016 and March 2018, holding, at various times, ministerial portfolios with responsibility for police (2016–2017), correctional services (2016–2017), emergency services (2016–2017), road safety (2016–2017), health (2017–2018), and mental health and substance abuse (2017–2018). Following the resignation of Jay Weatherill after the 2018 election defeat, a Labor caucus meeting on 9 April 2018 elected Malinauskas as Leader. He consequently became Leader of the Opposition, with former Education Minister Susan Close as his deputy. In March 2022, at the State election, Peter Malinauskas led the Labor Party to victory.

What has South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas got to do with all of this you may ask? Everything. The globalist policy emanating from central banksters has not missed a beat under his Premiership. The relatively recent granting of land rights of 15,000 km² of mid-North South Australian land to the Ngadjuri people, coupled with the unwavering pursuit of a Voice to the SA Parliament through an apartheid-election-process later this year, shows me, that in spite of the Commonwealth referenda and every South Australian electorate showing a clear majority objecting to the Voice to Parliament, South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas' objective is to continue on with this policy regardless. The banks were permitted to buy vast shareholdings in industry/manufacturing, and because all industry operates on overdrafts, the banks were readily able to monopolise their position, by creating money out of nothing – *ex nihilo*.

Monopoly and mainstream media orbit around each other. They are concentric. While we hear or read what appears to be opposing points of view, what is not readily appreciated is that this perceived dialectical clash ultimately leads on to further monopoly.

Would those attending and speaking be so readily committed to proposing further utility-monopoly, had this end objective of monopoly been brought to their attention prior to this rally? In the end that is what this is about, promoting a solution without thinking through the ramifications towards the individual. Second rate experts directing policy that first-rate experts will have no qualms 'blaming them for the outcome'.

What is noteworthy is that Matthew Condon writing for *The Australian*, is reporting of the upcoming event in Canberra to rally troops to listen to a sprinkling of Liberal, Nationals, PHON, Craig Kelly, Bob Katter, Alan Moran, Prof Peter Ridd and a host of others. Such a variety of differing persons and some supposedly antagonistic political parties coming together against <u>'Reckless Renewables'</u>. This crowd is unknowingly being played like a fiddle to the benefit of nuclear-monopolists.

Like Labor, the Liberal Party see no wrong in centralised administration for remote communities.
